Several crackers were also blasted during the attacks. sources said.

Awami League and BNI' workers claimed the attackers belonged to the Jatiya Party.

A case has been filed in this connection with Mohammadpur police.

## Where sabre-rattling is not the way

Workers of both the parties reported that they had not yet had any clash, nor any tension, since the camps were set up a fortnight ago.

The whole areas of the constituency, have worn a festive look with the activists of the contending parties bringing

out colourful processions, writing graffiti and campaigning door-to-door.

# Iraq again holds Perez responsible for war

NICOSIA, Feb 4 : Iraqi Foreign Minister Tarea Aziz today renewed his condemnation of UN Secretary General Javier Perez De Cuellar for allowing the US-led coalition to bomb Iraqi towns, reports AFP.

"Your silence is a shame, Mr. Aziz said in his second message to the UN Chief since the start January 17 of the USled Operation Descrt Storm to drive Iraqi troops from Kuwait.

Mr. Aziz, in a letter broadcast by official Baghdad Radio, denounced a UN decision authorising the Allies

to drive Iraq from Kuwait by

"The imperialist states have used the United Nations (decision) to oppress the people, impose their control on oil and bolster Israel's hegemony in the region," Mr. Aziz

"The principles of the United Nations have been violated." Crimes have been committed against the people (of Iraq) in the name of the cover of resolutions voted by UN member states through threats and pressure from

America and the Allies. The Iraqi people, but also all free and just men in the world, expect you to speak out because they consider the United Nations to be the defender of humanity," Mr. Aziz added.

The radio said the message was accompanied by "proof of the crimes committed against the Iraqi people" over the past 18 days.

Mr. Aziz had held the UN United Nations and under the chief personally responsible for the Gulf war in a message dated January 24, one week after the start of hostilities.

installations of the city. But in most cases, the targets are missed. Scores of residential buildings have been destroyed in the heavy air raids but the civilians are taking refuge in well-built bunkers which were built over the last few years, cycwitnesses say.

Mr. Sadeq Khan, a Bangladeshi journalist returning in the flight told newsmen that he had witnessed a Cruise missile falling near Al-Rasheed Hotel where he and other foreign newsmen were residing. An Iraqi anti-aircraft battery shot the missile and the debris of the missile fell on the ground. He said Iraq's anti-aircrast desence system is very strong.

He, however, contradicted the press reports that presidential palace in Baghdad was damaged by the raids. Only a conference hall adjacent to the palace was destroyed, he said. He even doubted the Allied forces' claim of destroying the nuclear and strategic military installations inside Iraq.

The residents are doing their normal work during the interval of the raids and even cars are moving on Baghdad streets, he said.

As the power facilities were damaged, most of the residents were living without electricity. Internal telephone lines also remain disrupted. There is also shortage of water in the city but some reports said there has been partial revival of water distribution sys-

Sadek said Iraqis living in rural areas are leading normal life and the effects of the war were yet to be felt. Saddam and his war against the 'enemies' are also getting popular support. Sadeq said Iraqis believe Saddam has justified his commitment to nation by hts deeds.

RIMINI (Italy), Feb 4: The 20th congress of the Italian Communist Party approved Sunday its transformation into the Democratic Party of the Left. The vote was 807-75, with 49 abstentions it came after four days of debate. The Italian Communist Party was founded 70 years and 13 days ago on January 21, 1921 at Livourne by Antonio Gramset. It was among the most powerful of communist parties in western Europe, reports AFP.

Discrimination against Iraqis

NEW YORK, Feb 4: The city Human Rights Comm has subpocnaed the president of Pan American World Airways over the airline's policy of barring lraqts from flights, a commission spokesman said Sunday. Commission spokesman Lonnic Soury said the panel 'requested and received a copy of the procedure which we feel is in possible violation of New York civil rights law. The law prohibits discrimination against people based on their citizenship and national origin, he said, reports AP.

Manila detains 11 Pakistanis

MANILA, Fcb 4: Immigration authorities detained 11 Pakistanis at Mantla's airport Monday under tightened control aimed at keeping out any possible terrorists, officials said. Ben Kalaw, an immigration control officer at the Ninoy Aquino International Airport, said authorities decided to refuse entry to the 11, who claimed to be tourists, for "security reasons," reports AP.

#### Nine killed in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, Feb 4: Nine people died in weekend unrest, including six men fatally shot or stabbed during a flery rampage through a Natal township, police said Monday. The police unrest report said a large group of people set fire to about 150 dwellings and attacked their occupants Saturday night in Magoda, in eastern Natal Province, reports AP.

#### 6,000 workers to leave Taiwan

TAIPEL, Feb 4: About 6,000 foreigners working illegally in Taiwan have signed up for voluntary deportation, police reported Monday. Police stations in Taipei country and nearby Taoyuan country are busy handling applications from such workers, police said, adding most of them were Filipinos and Malaysians, reports AP.

#### Torkham route to reopen ISLAMABAD, Feb 4: The Pakistan government is reported

to have decided to reopen the Torkham trade route leading to Afghanistan from Pakistan after three years of closing. This decision was taken after consultation with Afghan mujahideen (Muslim guerillas), who were opposed to the opening of this trade route before, officials said Monday, reports Xinhua.

#### Chinese activists will be tried

BEIJING, Feb 4: Two Chinese dissident leaders will be tried Tuesday on charges of organizing and leading a counter revolutionary group, the Beijing People's Intermediate Court announced. The charges against Chen Yanlin and Zhang Yafei were more serious than those in other recent cases against dissidents and were punishable by not less than five year's imprisonment, reports AFP.

Iraqi forces is a preparation for ground attack -- now widely seen in the West as the only way to reverse President Saddam Hussein's August 2 conquest of Kuwait.

Iraq frequently calls for guerilla attacks on the United States and its allies. But Saddam is putting his

faith mainly in his army, still regarded by the allies as a formidible force in spite of the hammering it has endured from the air and the disruption of its communications and supply lines. Baghdad taunted its ene-
