



The team is an extension of the work Joyner-Kersee already has been doing on her own with youngsters. She has devoted much of her time to children through speaking appearances and clinics, and has been keynote speaker for functions across the country.

"I enjoy speaking to kids, the ones about 9 or 10." Joyner-Kersee, 28, said. "If you can tap into their minds early. they can focus on what they want to do, even though it's about 10 years down the road. You can give them something to shoot for.

"I've come across people, older people, who have no goals. They're just living from day to day.

Joyner-Kersee began running at age 9 for the East St. Louis Railers, a club team coached by George Ward. When Ward decided to concentrate on the boys, Nino Fennoy took the girls' job. Fennoy worked with

Joyner-Kersee through elementary school and junior high on the club level, then followed her to Lincoln High as coach, maintaining the continuity and helping with her development. Joyner-Kersee recalls
