Convicted doctors' appeal rejected

MYMENSINGH, Feb 6 The appeal by three convicted doctors for negligence of duty causing death to a patient injured in a bus accident has been rejected and the sen tences awarded to them upheld by the Additional Sessions Judge, Mr. Rafiqui

After hearing of the appeal filed by the doctors in April last year the Additional Sesstons Judge gave hts decision Inst Tuesday (Jan 29).

Earlier, in April last year the Assistant Sessions Judge, Mr. A K M Anwar Hossain had sentenced Prof. Humayun Kabir and Dr. Shah Yakubul Azad of Mymensingh Medical College to pay a fine of Taka 20,000 each in default to suffer 4 months' rigorous imprisonment. Dr. Nurul Islam of Haluaghat Health Complex was fined Taka 10,000 in default 2 months' R.L

Besides, all the three docfors were also sentenced to two months' simple imprisonment each.

The doctors were, however, on bail following their appeal (No.39 of 1990) before the

District Judge It was alleged that the putient Hatem Alt. injured in a bus accident near Hahaghat on April 25, 1988, was taken to a health complex where Dr. Nurul Islam stitched and bandaged him without eleaning the wounds. Next day he was

shifted to Mymensingh Medical College Hospital and admitted to orthopaedic ward by the emergency medical officer. Dr. Yakubul Azad. But no doctors had attended him for two days since his admission. despite repeated requests to both Dr. Azad and Prof. Kabir. Rather they advised the relatives to take the patient to a private clinic. As his condition continued

to worsen the patient on the fourth day of his accident was released from the hospital at the initiative of the relatives and was taken to "Momenshahi Clinic" where the attending doctor examined and found gangrin in the leg due to negligence. The patient was sent back to Mymensingh Medical College Hospital and operated upon by Prof. Humayun Kabir same night and amputed the right leg below the waist. The patient died on April 30, 1988 morning as the operation was not successful

Road journey hazardous in Narayanganj

NARAYANGANJ, Feb 6: Number of road accidents in Narayangani district has increased in recent days. At least 36 persons died and more than 200 others were injured in 48 accidents during the last four months.

Bus journey on different routes has become hazardous due to absence of proper control of respective authorities and bus syndicates. Over-loading, late running and undesirable competitions on the roads by the drivers have become a regular feature on these routes. According to the Inter-Dis-

trict bus syndicate authority, about 1000 buses and minibuses are plying everyday carrying nearly one lakh passengers in eight routes to offer about 2,000 trips a day covering Narayanganj and Dhaka district behind Aricha Chat.

The time-table and overall management of these routes

were controlled by Narayanganj Inter-District and Dhaka Matropolitan City and Inter-District Bus Owners Association. Due to loose control of associations these buses are seen plying at drivers will causing untold sufferings to the passengers, particularly to

children and womenfolk. Most of the mail, local or express buses in the name of "Gate Lock" are engaged in dangerous competition to pickup almost all the passengers to whatever distance they intend to travel. Over crowded buses at maximum speed seldom allow other vehicles to overtake them and ultimately involve in serious road mishaps.

Although present fare rate is 32 paisa for buses and 36 paisa for minibuses per kilometre, it is alleged that most conductors collect fares at their whims, resulting in altercation between the bus

employees and passengers. This has become a regular scature on all the routes.

The Narayanganj-Dhaka highway is nothing but a source of nightmare not only to motorists alone but also to pedestrians.

This 16kms long highway was constructed in 1986. The concrete portion of the highway has deteriorated beyond any repair. The metalled is also two narrow for the safe passage of the increased vehicular traffic. Accidents are numerous and damage to vehicles due to bad condition of the roads is also enormous.

A large number of trucks carrying goods and local buses are using the highway everyday made the road very bumpy. Both unpaved sides become speed barriers due to erosion. Drivers are found reluctant to give passage to on-coming vehicles or faster vehicles from same direction.

Heroin addicts on rise

PABNA, Feb 6: Heroin addiction cases are increasing alarmingly in the local town. Nearly 1000 families have been ruined as an effect of the heroin addiction and at least 100 persons died.

Heroin is being openly sold in the town and the law enforcing agencies pay a deaf car to. Out of an estimated 10,000 heroin addicts, rickshaw pullers, businessmen, frustrated youths and a number of political leaders are among

Heroin is reportedly smuggled into the town from Chapainawabganj via Ishurdi. A section of dishonest businessmen is making brisk business in heroin trade.

Our Rajshahi Correspondent adds: Drug addiction is on the risc in Rajshahi city and its adjoining areas morally degrading the young people and threatening the society.

lleroin, opium, charash, pathidine, sedatives and wine are being openly sold at shops in city areas, dwellers complained. According to an estimate,

about 30,000 people between age group 10 and 60 years have been addicted to drugs throughout the district.

The addicted persons and

others connected with trading, smuggling and storing of drugs have been doing their business

Drug addicted people are involved in various crimes like hijacking and looting to collect money for buying sedatives.

A well organised crime circle is allegedly involved in smuggling intoxicamts into the country from across the border through different border points in Greater Rajshahi dis-

The people have called upon the concerned authorities to take stringent measures against drug traffickers.

Teacher shortage in schools

CHAPAINAWABGANJ, Feb 6 The primary schools of Chapainawabganj district espe cially in the interior villages have been facing various problems for a long time.

Out of total 481 primary schools, 369 are government and 112 are private. According to the sources, the schools should be provided with 2405 teachers in total but there are only 1711 teachers now. About

694 posts of the teachers are vacant since long. Besides, 11 schools are running without headmasters. Due to acute provision of

classrooms the teachers are compelled to take classes under the open sky. Very few schools in the rural areas have toilets. Though the concerned authorities have been informed several times of the problems. no initiatives have been taken

to solve the problems. The Lompat Mollatola Primary School of Uzirpur union under Shibganj upazila has 600

students. Due to lack of classrooms students are compelled to take their lessons under the shade of a banyan tree in front of the school.

There are only two damaged classrooms where water leaks through the roofs

Hailstorm lashes Kushtia: crops damaged
