Marriages are made in heaven, goes the common saying and indeed if one were to see the colourful marriage preparations in this part of Asia, one would almost believe it.

Generally, Muslim marriages are dominated by social custom going beyond the simple religious ceremony which faith dictates. If one counts the number of occasions, beginning from the time when the boy's side visit to "look" at the bride-to-be, till the final reception given by the boy's side, it could last any-

Such customs have naturally spawned its own market and specialized shops cater-

ing to the marriage crowd, is quite common now. Usually named "Zori Mahal", "Zori Bitan," "Shubho Bibaho" etc. Dhaka has these kinds of shops in almost every shopping centre of the city, be it big or small.

These shops are easily identified by the dazzling and glittering streamers and decorations of other kinds, hung all around the shops. It is a small enclosed world of beauty and eye-catching colours.

As one enters these shops, a whole indulgent world awaits. The rows of shelves are full of cosmetics and toiletries, both local and of foreign make.

However, a very interesting part of these shops are that they mostly supply items used for the "Gaye Holud", a function which takes place both at the bride's as well as the groom's; two or three days before the actual wedding day. This has nothing to do with Muslim marriages ritually, but much with traditional Indian custom.

The Agricultural Sector Team of the Canadian International Development Agency (AST/CIDA) has initiated a programme that seeks to provide professional training to bright young university women graduates.

The programme aims at increasing the availability of experienced women professionals who can work as consultants on development projects.

The need for the programme became evident when AST, a technical assistance project of the Ministry Agriculture, found that very few women applied for vacant consultant positions. Those who did apply usually had insufficient work experience to qualify. It was recognized that other agencies were also expressing the same difficulty and the idea of giving on-thejob experience to young women was borne. Most development agencies are looking for women professionals because it is recognized that women are often the beneficiaries of projects and its important women's interests are taken into account when projects are prepared. As such, women development special-

ists are in high demand. The responsibility for developing the Young Women Professionals in Training Programme was given to AST Consultant N. E. Fatmi, who advertised in local papers and passed the word at the Dhaka University campus. Ninety applications were received and all were invited to write a brief essay on various development topics. The best 12 essays were determined and the authors invited to personal interviews. Of the 12 interviewed. four were selected for the programme.




