63,303 return from Iraq, Kuwait

Minister of State for Food Barrister Najmul Huda told the Jatiya Sangsad on Sunday that a total of 63,303 Bangladesh citizens returned home from Kuwait and Iraq after Iraq invaded Kuwait, reports BSS.

Replying to a question from Mosharraf Hossain (AL-Netrokona-Mymensingh). Huda said, 56,067 of the returnees were from Kuwait and the rest from Iraq. He said detailed information had been gathered from them.

In reply to another question from A T M Alamgir (BNP-Comilla), he said the government had already started talks with the government of Kuwait through the Bangladesh Embassy there and Kuwaiti Embassy in Dhaka on the question of taking back the Bangladesh expatriates.

He said efforts were under way to send the returnees back to Kuwait as soon as possible.
