Women today must go out to work and to study. They even do the marketing away from home and feel the need to go visiting or marketing away from home and feel the need to go visiting or window shopping on their free mornings. For travel to and fro the offices, education institutions or the market places, it is necessary that there should be efficient cheap and easily available transport. But this is not so.

When it is bothersome for men to go to work it is twice as difficult for women to go from one place to another. They are often overcharged by the rickshaws and the scarce autorickshaws, and do not have enough room for themselves in the buses. If they dare to take a lift, they immediately land themselves in serious trouble or

find themseives in an embarrassing sit-

uation. Travelling in Dhaka is thus rather an ordeal if one does not have the money to hire a trishaw or a cab or even possess a third-hand car of one's own. Speaking to a women one is convinced that the prospect of travelling can be tiresome and

upsetting. "I was buying a small cake for my sister's birthday at the 'Sheraton' pastry shop, and was looking around in the vicinity for a gift of a shampoo, when it got a little past sunset. I helped myself to a rickshaw and few within minutes," says Shaheen young woman about town, "I was closely followed in

couple of men.

The rickshawman said to me, 'Do you know these men? They are asking you to stop at Elephant Road.' I then realised much to my horror that I was being taken for a woman of pleasure. The men in the other rickshaw snarled at me," Shaheen reported, "You must have taken money from some rich man in the hotel. What is wrong with our money?" Shaheen, in turn was thoroughly distraught by the experience.

"Once I was late for my classes," said a school teacher Mahjabeen. "As there was a heavy rush for traffic I could not get a rickshaw or a babytaxi. A medium sized car, with what looked like an average office goer, stopped, and asked if I

wanted a lift to the city. I had taken lifts when I was abroad so I did not hesitate to climb in with my parcel of students' exercise books, " she continued. "However, after five minutes of cheerful conversation the driver varied his route away from the direction of the school. BUET teachers form disaster assistance team



A central control room has been set up at the ADAB office at Laimatta to keep overall and round-the-clock contact. NGOs have been requested to send reports of their activities to the control room.

Babu, a school boy and leader of the "Progoti Sangha", said they are getting unprecedented response from the people, many of whom have given even new clothes. He said they will visit the cyclone affected areas as soon as possible to distribute the clothes.
