# Diarrhoea in cyclone-hit areas

Diarrhoeal diseases, already to Chittagong town after visit

ing Kutubdia, Banshkhali. Anwara and Sttakunda told our staffer that 250 people in all those places had died of diarrhoeal diseases so far. Pure water is virtually non-existent in vast areas of the coastal belt and the survivors are forced to drink contaminated water for their survival. 
