tion day. It was evident from the argument yesterday that the High Court used its power to accept the petition "sue motto" in spite of a bar laid down in the Section 526 of the Criminal Procedure which states that 'intimation should be given to the trial Judge before any petition to the higher court under Section 526."

In the petition the accused feared that he might not get fair judgement from the Special Tribunal as the Judge himself was 'biased'.

During the submission of the petition yesterday before the High Court Division Bench. Defence Lawyer Strajul Haque said that he was convinced the accused would not get justice in the Tribunal and accordingly on the advice of the accused the petition for transferring the case who filed.

Attorney General Aminul Haque said that the contents of the petition were not true.

Intimation of transfer of the case was once given to the trial court on March 27, 1991 but since then no question had been raised by the Defence Lawyers about the fairness of the Judge till May 12, 1991 he added

Attorney General said that the petition was made at this stage for inordinate delay of the trial which is if so facto il-

About the alleged bias of the trial court the Attorney General presented the Court proceedings published in the daily newspapers and said that the allegation was false and without sufficient grounds.

He said that the materials in support of the allegation of bias of the trial Court produced by the Defence, was not correct and practically not rele-

Again the non-intimation of the petition to the trial court if so-facto rendered the petition illegal, the Attorney General The Division Bench com-

prised of Justice Anwarul Haque Chowdhury and Justice Habibur Rahman Khan gave a patient hearing to the arguments of both the parties and fixed the next date for hearing

# India goes to polls

city where curfew was imposed at the weekend ahead of the elections.

Police slapped a curlew on parts of the Hindu holy city of Varanasi on Saturday after supporters of rival parties clashed using homemade bombs and hurling stones. At least one person was killed, 50 were injured and two slum districts were set on fire, police said.

Some 1.5 million police and paramilitary forces were deployed across India on Sunday ahead of the parliamentary elections that analysis say could be the bloodiest ever.

### Security

About 40 per cent of India's voters will cast ballots on Monday. The remainder will vote on May 23 and 26. Watching them will be the largest security force deployed for an election in India, where seizures of poll booths by armed gangs and voter intimidation are common.

Most 11th-hour opinion polls had Gandhi, scion of the Nehru-Gandhi dynasty that has ruled the country at the head of the staid Congress (I) almost without interruption since independence in 1947, as a firm front-runner.

But almost to a man the polls doubted whether Gandhi. 47. who Bungled his last bid for power in 1989 losing out to VP Singh, and now running on a stability manifesto could win enough seats in the 545-seat Parliament to rule alone.

The attackers first raided the D-block of Al-Beruni Hall They fired about 70 rounds of gunshot and damaged windows of several rooms.

The attackers then went to Shaheed Salam-Barkat Hall and beat the inmates of Room No. 311. Rezaul Karim and Shahroj. From there, the attackers went to AFM Kamaluddin Hall and shot Runu on his shoulder and stabbed Jewel The attackers then forced their way into Mir Mosharraf Hossain Hall. They went to Room No. 357 and stabbed Liton and Moazzem while they were in sleep. They also stabbed VP of the hall Golam Farug and Aminul Islam Mukul who came out in the corridor hearing a commotion.

The attackers chased the acting VP of JUCSU and also beat him. They left the campus after about one hour of rampage. The injured were rushed to hospitals immediately after the incident.

Later, in the morning, general students of the halls caught Abdul Halim whom they identified as a member of the attacking group and beat him with iron rods.



### Osirak N-plant bombing on Israeli TV

JERUSALEM, May 19: The Israeli Air Force on Saturday made public for the first time a film of the 1981 bombing of the Iraqi Ostrak Nuclear Plant near Baghdad. The film, shown on Israeli television, was made by the pilots carrying out the strike on June 7, 1981. ### 4,000 Kuwaitis still missing

JEDDAH (Saudi Arabia), May 19 : Nearly 4,000 Kuwaitis are still missing and believed to be held by Iraq more than 11 weeks after the end of the Gulf War, Kuwait Deputy Justice Minister Abdel Aztz al-Dakhtl said today. He told the Saudi Ash-Sharq al-Awsat newspaper that 6.686 Kuwaiti prisoners of war captured by Iraqi troops during their occupation of the Emirate have nevertheless returned home since the war ended in February, reports AFP.

### 30 killed in Nigeria

LAGOS, May 19: About 30 people were killed during clashes between two communities over the ownership of a fish pond in Benue state of south-eastern Nigeria last week. reported the daily "Punch" today. Another 42 people were seriously injured and about 600 families were displaced during the clashes, said the paper, reports Xinhua.

### 3 killed in Pak ethnic violence

HYDERABAD. May 19: Three people were killed and 16 others wounded on Sunday by gunmen passing through a deserted market as shopkeepers observed a province-wide strike organized by a radical secessionist group. Police said the gunmen were enforcing a strike called by the Jeay Sindh Progressive Party, a radical group demanding independence for Sindh province, which has been troubled by years of ethnie fighting, reports AP
