Reader-Paper Gap Should be Narrowed'

It is indeed a difficult task to paint an authentic portrait of the Indian journalist Chanchal Sarker, because it demands a lot of artistry to highlight the facets of his personality and do justice to his career.

The world of journalism is quite fascinating. "Comment is free, facts are sacred," C.P. Scott, a great editor of the 'Manchester Guardian', made that much-quoted statement of a main principle of journalism. Who are journalists? A journalist informs and communicates with the world around him/her. He conveys the events of the day distilled into a few words, sounds or pictures, processed by the mechanics of communication to satisfy the human curiosity of a world that is always eager to know what's new!

Chanchal Sarker was recently here on a

brief visit in a two-member delegation representing the Editors Guild of India. This was to the express Guild's solidarity with the people and media in the aftermath of April 29, cyclone.

In an interview with The Daily Star, Chanchal Sarker was asked, "Why do you think that the standard of journalism especially in English, has dropped in South Asia? What is the solution?"

He answered with an expert view, "In India, it has certainly not dropped. Special areas have developed. There are more business journals and economic papers now, for example, The Economic Times', 'Business Standards' are widely circulated. The other big step forward is

the magazine journalism, and it is progressing well in other languages in different states. Video magazine is another side of journalism which has now by passed our otherwise dull television. They have given a new light to the news world

"If you look at the Indian press, every one has been wrongly predicting the decline or death of English papers. Hard, serious, journalism is what we see in English press. There are a number of new newspapers which introduce new bylines. This is, in fact, quite encouraging and promising for young journalists. The number of women journalists has shot up. They are undoubtedly enterpris-

There is a tremendous expansion in language papers in India, which offer a light reading compared to the English ones. It must not be ignored that things are changing very fast even in the technological sector. Though it cannot be at the same pace with that of the Western world, as it involves large

Chanchal Sarker went on to put forward a few relevant suggestions for the improvement of journalism not only in India but in the neighbouring countries, too. "Yes, I do agree that the standard of journalism could be much better. The big step is through training and readership study. One thing I think which is lacking in our press is that our readers are very undemanding. Newspaper people should be in greater touch with the readers, by holding periodical meetings. This would narrow the gap between the two sides. There should be more stress in investigative journalism, though it is going on in full swing in India."

Asked "What are the training facilities for young journalists"?, Mr Sarkar said : "The world is becoming so much complex and

> mechanised. One nceds a lot of training, more so as our universities are inflexible institutions. In anyway, training in the job is an essentiality, especially for journal ists. They should be trained to express themselves well and concisely. It has to be taught and learnt thoroughly. And

"One of the main factor is that the industry mush play a bigger/greater role in training. They must set up institutions or should be able to arrange courses for longer time for specialisation. Ex-

> Chanchal Sarker was educated in St. Xavier's school and college and the Presidency College, the most reputable institutions of India. He later went to Claire College of Cambridge University. But he did not stop there. He also completed his Bar-at-Law in England. His inclination to journalism from his student life, influenced him to join the Statesman on returning to Calcutta.

> On leaving the Statesman a few years later, Mr Sarkar became the founder and the first director of the Press Institute of India (PII), where he served for eighteen years. After retirement he is now a regular columnist with two top English dailies of India - the Hindustan Times, and Indian Express and various other papers outside the country.




