After a five-hour long discussion both sides have agreed to maintain peaceful coexistence.



## Gumti project to cost huge additional fund

COMILLA, June 4: Gumti embankment project undertaken by the Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB) is yet to be completed. Delay in completion of the embankment has exposed over one lakh people to hazards. The project is progressing at a snail's pace. Crops on about 20,000 acres of land under the project area at Daudkandi, Devidwar, Muradnagar and Burichang have already been damaged.

Breaches have developed at many points of the embankment and vast areas of nine unions of Muradnagar have been flooded. As a result thousands of people have been affected and a large number of cattleheads and poultry birds has been lost. To save Muradnagar, Devidwar, Daudkandi and Homna from the wrath of the Gumti the project at a cost of Taka 72 crores 82 lakh was undertaken in 1984. Funded by the World Bank, the project was supposed to be completed in 1988-89. Meantime, the BWDB has requested the World Bank to extend the project for two more years and the total cost of the project has been refixed at Taka 125 crore. The proposal is now under consideration of the World Bank.

There were irregularities in

land acquisition and earth cutting. The people of the area
are anxiously waiting for the
completion of the project.

# Defective planning hampers cultivation

HABIGANJ, June 4: The cultivation has become uncertain on 30,000 acres of land in Gungjuri haor due to defective planning of Water Development Board to protect crops from early flood at a cost of Taka 19,56,000.

The farmers alleged that cultivable lands in Habiganj Sadar, Bahubal, Nabiganj and Baniachong upazilas of the district will remain fallow if the scheme is implemented.

Besides wastage of money, it will also bring untold sufferings to thousands of peasants, they added.

The scheme included construction of 54 kilometres embankment on both sides of Karangi river. Putijhuri-Sanghat-Bagdiar road and 12 kilometres early flood protection embankment, reexcavation of 124 kilometer long hilly channel and construction of seven sluice gate.

### US Task Force enters last phase of operations

States Military Joint Task
Force enters its last phase of operations. Winding down from two weeks of intensive work of transferring needed food, clothing and medical supplies to those uprooted by the cyclone of 29 April. USS Operation Sea Angel will be

coming to a gradual end.

While Operation Sea Angel was in full swing, US Navy air cushion landing craft (LCAC) transported desperately needed items from the port here to the nearby island of Sandwip.

LCAC's from the navy ship USS Anchorage (LSD-36) were on their way home from the Persian Gulf when President George Bush had them diverted to Bangladesh to help with the relief efforts. Conducting as many as four missions a day, the LCAC's transported more than 1,586.6 tons of urgently needed supplies to Sandwip during the 12 days of operations.

The LCAC is capable of carrying loads of 40 to 60 tons
