### US restriction downs shrimp price

Price of Bangladesh shrimp suddenly dropped in the international market by about 15 per cent over the last week following US decision to restrict entry of the item in the wake of recent cyclone.

Trading circle told UNB-on Monday Japan and almost all European buyers were taking advantage of the US decision and forced down the price.

The United States Food and Drug Administration (USFDA) had been inspecting all consignments of shrimp shipped from Bangladesh after May 14 fearing contamination by the disaster.

The council was informed that the need for greater mobilization of domestic resources, for bringing about greater financial discipline for reducing unproductive expenditure for higher investment in the private sector and for proper implementation of the Annual Development Programmes was emphasized in the consortium meeting.

The report of the Council Committee on Food headed by the Agriculture Minister Majid-ul-Haq, was present at the meeting. The council was informed that a total of more than one lakh seventyseven thousand tonnes of foodgrain had, so far, been pledged as foreign aid for the cyclone affected people.

Procurement of IRRI and Boro is progressing well. Two lakh tonnes were procured in May. More than one lakh seventy thousand tonnes is expected to be procured in June. The council was informed that the food position in the country was quite satisfactory.

The council approved an amendment proposed to be made in the Administrative Tribunal Act 1980. The amendment seeks to provide for appeal from decisions of the Administrative Appellate Tribunal to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court by special leave on questions of law. A bill would in this regard be presented to the Jatiya Snagsad in the next session.

The council decided that in order to resolve the acute accommodation problem of the judicial officers of the country, government accommodation would be kept earmarked for them in the four divisional

headquarters. Transport facilities would also be made available to them in these four cities. In other places suitable transport allowance would be given to

The council also decided to raise the retirement age of the judicial officers from fiftyseven to sixty years. A bill expected to be presented for the purpose to the Jatiya Sangsad in its next session.





### Violence continues in Algeria

ALGIERS, June 10: Political violence, including saliotage, has persisted despite calls by Islamic fundamentalist leaders for an end to protest that resulted in a state of siege, authorities said Monday. Security officials said at least 34 people had been arrested since Saturday in various incidents of unrest, including two assaults by a crowd of 600 people on an Algiers police station where two Islamic militants were jailed, reports AP.

WASHINGTON, June 10: George Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev are not likely to hold their summit until sometime after the mid-July economic summit of the seven major industrialised nations in London, the White House said Monday. Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said he could not rule out the possibility that a superpower summit could be held before then, reports AP.

### 20 hurt as launch owners assault bus passengers

ARICHA (Manikganj), June and Daulatdia 10: At least 20 people were injured when motor launch workers and owners, demanding higher fare, assaulted inter-city coach passengers and supervisers here today, witnesses said, reports UNB.

They said the launch workers and owners carried on their assault twice between 11 am to 1 pm in a bid to stop bus passengers and supervisers from using BIWTC ferry instead of motor launches.

Eight injured people were admitted to Goalundo Hospital across the river.

Inter-city buses usually hire motor launches to ferry their passengers between Aricha owners abruptly demanded higher fare from the buses. They demanded Tk 400 instead of the existing Tk 300 for carrying passengers of each

The bus supervisors refused their demand of higher fare and instead opted for BIWIC ferry, which infuriated the launch owners and workers leading to the assault, witnesses said.

The proposed bill will also create a transitional provision under Article 150 of the Constitution to validate the appointment of the Acting President and his actions under special circumstances, and to allow him to go back to the Supreme Court Bench as Chief Justice. This provision will be to ensure that none can challenge the appointment of the caretaker government and the actions taken by it to hold a free and fair election.

The BNP will try to remove all possible factors that may contribute to instability under a parliamentary form, said a constitutional expert of the

The bill may thus seek to amend Article 70 of the Constitution providing that MPs belonging to a party can not only vote against it, but also

cannot form rival party groups. Sources say even restrictions on voting of coalition partners are also being contemplated. Provisions may be made so that coalition partners would have to vote for the government till the expiry of the full term of the Parliament.

Again, the provision of adoption of no confidence motions may be so defined that such a motion should come through a specific resolution stating the reasons. Mere adoption of an ordinary resolution moved by an opposition bench member may not be

The BNP bill will have a good number of provisions identical to those of the AL bill which also retains 'Bismillah' in the Constitution.

Differences between the two bills will be regarding the basic state principles where the AL seeks to restore secularism and socialism; and the extra safety provisions against floor crossing by MPs to be proposed by the BNP.

The proposed bill, if passed, will end the debate on the form of government. The debate owes its origin to the November 19 Joint Declaration of the eight-party, seven-party and five-party alliances on the basis of which power was transferred to a neutral government that organised free and fair elections to form a

sovereign Parliament. The Joint Declaration calls for establishment of an "accountable government".

While the Awami League and its allies openly advocated for a parliamentary form of government, BNP leaders kept their mouths shut. They only said that the issue would be resolved in the Parliament.

The government has already created six special tribunals to accelerate the processing of income tax proposals. An extensive computerisation programme is also being implemented in this context to improve tax administration.

Available indications further suggested that the government would introduce revenue measures to compensate for the decision to eliminate land development tax on agricultural and to about eight acres.

Special measures will be taken to strengthen revenue collection at the local government level.

A key structural reform under the national budget for 1991-92 will be the introduction of the Value-Added Tax (VAT). This tax will be levied at a single rate at the manufacturing -cum-import stage. Higher import duty rates on goods such as alcohol, tobacco, petroleum products and luxury items will be proposed to be largely replaced by trade-neutral supplementary excise du-

Concessions in import duty and tax rates which "discriminate by type of importer or user" will be eliminated in a phased basis, according to available indicators.

A further simplification of the tariff structure will be proposed under the budget. The maximum tariff rate, other than that for specified luxury

goods, is likely to be reduced to 75 per cent in 1991-92. The government will put in place a mechanism for better
