An Andaman volcano wakes up with Unzen, Pinatubo

NEW DELHI, June 26: A volcano on a tiny, uninhabited Indian Ocean island has erupted after being dormant for nearly 200 years and is periodically spewing hot lava and ash, officials said today, reports AFP.

Scientists of the Geological Survey of India (GSI) were studying the eruption on Barren Island and it was not clear how long it would last, a GSI official here said.

Barren Island is among the 3,000 islands that make up India's Andaman and Nicobar islands governed by New Delhi. Port Blair, its capital, is some 1,190 kilometres (743 miles) from Madras.

The official said the eruption, the first since 1803, was first noticed by an Indian naval ship at the end of April.

"It is throwing out lava and ash up to 800 metres (2.640 feet) high," he said. "Our scientists have gone there and conducted some studies. The studies are still continuing." These are periodic activi-

The Telegraph newspaper said Barren Island was connected to the Indo-Burmese arc of mostly dead or dormant volcanos, and that lava ejected by the volcano was flowing down the slope of a cone.

It also quoted GSI scientists in Calcutta as saying that the eruption 'was likely to affect the natural vegetation as well as fisheries in the area" but it would in no way disrupt life in Port Blair, 125 kilometres (78 miles) away.

But GSI scientists said the Barren Island volcano was unrelated to the volcanic belt known as the Pacific ring of fire which runs through Japan and the Philippines.

The 100 days have borne out that the BNP government has not only weathered those adversaries but also implemented some of the party's pre-election pledges.

To list the achievements of the 100 days, as observers agree, the post-cyclone situation was handled fairly efficiently - much to the satisfaction of the donors and the international community as well as the people.

Then merely six-week old, the government, despite its lack of much experience in disaster management, enlisted the support and sympathy of the international community and handled the post-calamity situation successfully.

The vexing jail revolt was also contained successfully and a crackdown was launched on corruption and smuggling.

Recently the Prime

Minister informed parliament that smuggling has fallen in the past three months resulting in the increase of the value of Taka against foreign cur-

Within three weeks of her assuming the office of Prime Minister, Begum Zia fulfilled some of her election commitments: waiving tax on holdings up to 25 bighas of agricultural land, raising the age limit for entering government service from 27 years to 30, and exempting agricultural loans up to Taka 5,000 and interest

The donors' confidence in the new democratic government was reflected in the outcome of the last month's Aid Bangladesh Consortium meeting in Paris which pledged 2.3 billion US dollars in development assistance for the coun-

The figure is more than what the donors pledged last year (1.8 billion US dollars) and has been the highest so far committed by the Consortium which also credited the new administration with good economic management despite the critical situation created by the Gulf War and the devastating cyclone.

On the diplomatic plane, Begum Zia undertook missions to Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and UAE as well as to China which have been viewed as significant strides in consolidating the country's external relations.

During her visit to Saudi Arabia, King Fahd extended allout support to the new democratic government under her leadership. Riyadh pledged 106 million US dollars for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of the country's cyclone-battered coastal

In Kuwait, Begum Zia

reached an understanding on re-employment of the nearly 65,000 Bangladeshi workers who had been displaced from that country due to the Gulf War. Kuwait is also expected to take additional workforce from Bangladesh to help reconstruct the war-ravaged country.

Her three-day foray to China was also seen as significant in that it gave her an opportunity to establish rapport with the Chinese leadership-who have been a great friend of Bangladesh since late President Zia established diplomatic relations with Beijing.

The China visit yielded a pledge of Taka 40 crore to Bangladesh as commodity and project aid. Besides, China offered to supply 200 powertillers and assured all possible assistance for the socio-economic development of Bangladesh.

But, apart from all these achievements, the most significant development is expected to come on the politiplane where the ruling BNP has of late made its stand clear on the country's form of government, hitherto a major issue of controversy.

A decision on the form of government, according to observers, should also pave the way for smooth transfer of power. A constitutional amendment bill seeking switchover to parliamentary system is on the anvil and likely to be placed in parliament in the next few days.

BNP's decision to switch over to parliamentary form of government, fulfilling Begum Zia's pledge to reflect the aspiration of the people. should resolve, once and for all, a crucial issue that has floundered all through the country's 20-year history.
