Before the fruits have even ripened the urchins, neighbouring servants and the hungry vagrants deprive the trees of the tropical fruits before the owners get a chance to sniff at the ri-

pened prod house it is once again difficult to tell them to lay their hands off the flora and fruits. I know of an old lady who rents out her apartments and spends half her time guarding her roses even though she is in her eighties, and there are rumours afloat that she suffers from cancer. When the hibiscus or the "mehendi" is pinched by the neighbouring child or servant, or even the adult tenants, she is not amused. Why should she be? After all it cost her some money to buy the plants in the first instance, and she has to keep a servant just to tend the garden, like so many other middle class people in

What is the dog doing - where is the chowkidar, one wonders. Rover the pet is well-fed but too lazy or sleepy to bark at the real thieves. Perhaps his energy is gone in yapping cious fruits. shoo off the marauders by day and night?

Similarly you can barely keep your "champas" and jasmines safe as the "tokais" come early in the morning to plunder the garden, to make garlands to sell in the streets. 
noyed that the things that belong to you are now the possessions of the Oliver Twists and Fagins of the city.

Heavy rains likely

Different parts of the country experienced downpour with 137 mm at Kutubdia, the highest during the last 12 hours till 6 pm on Friday.

The rainfall in Dhaka city was recorded 50 mm, reports Meteorological Department.

Teknaf experienced the 2nd highest downpour of 95 mm. Chittagong had 87 mm. Sandwip 45, Feni 37, Comilla 30, Khepupara 20, Cox's Bazar and Faridpur 15, Bhola, Sylhet and Bogra 14. Hattya 11. Iswardt and Rajshahi 10 mm rains during the same period.

Met office also forecasts heavy fall likely to occur at one or two places over Chittagong and Dhaka divisions during the next 24 hours commencing 6 pm on Friday.

Light to moderate rain or shower accompanied by temporary gusty wind with a few moderately heavy falls may occur at most places over Chittagong, Dhaka and Rajshahi divisions and at many places over Khulna division during the same pe-

Journalists Association. Members of the SAMA unanimously agreed to seek regional assistance to initiate programmes to exchange newspapers, periodicals, video Delegates from the region and audio magazines, facilitate

the exchange of news by adopting a concessionary flat rate, exchange of media personnel, ease restrictions on travel for media professionals in the region and develop media training networks, the

press release said. They also agreed that there was a need to legalise the right of the media to have access to information. It was also emphasised that the media must use such information in the public interest and without

discrimination against any

section of society.

Colombo has been chosen as the headquarters for the seven-country SAMA with the Editor of the Observer, HLD Mahindapala, President of the Sri Lanka Working Journalists Association, as the convenor.

Mahindapala said the establishment of SAMA was the logical outcome of the declaration of the fifth SAARC summit held in Male in 1990, which accepted regional cooperation through mass communications
