

Gorbachev threatens to quit: EC to recognise 3 Baltic states

MOSCOW, Aug 27: President Mikhail S Gorbachev on Tuesday warned that "everything is collapsing" and threatened to resign if the union is not preserved, report agencies.

"I'm for a renewed union, a reformed union. I'm for maintaining it," he told the riational Parliament. He said that if a new Union Treaty is not agreed upon, "I will resign. Nothing will be achieved if we cannot have a union."

Gorbachev, speaking forcefully and chopping the air with his hands, told lawmakers he would "do everything possible to prevent our country from falling apart."

"Our common point is that the USSR should be maintained as a union of sovereign states. Everyone is in favour of a unified defense, a unified armed forces . . .," . he told the Supreme Soviet.

BNP bars Ministers from campaigning in bye-polls

State Minister for Land Zamiruddin Sircar a nominee of the ruling BNP in the September 11 by-election, re-

signed Tuesday. His resignation follows a party decision that its nominees for the by-election holding ministerial posts would resign and that no Minister or State Minister would campaign for candidates in their constituencies after September 7 to ensure a free and fair polls.

Barrister Sircar will contest the by-election in Dhanmondi-Mohammadpur (Dhaka-9) con stituency, the seat vacated by his party Chief and Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia.

The BNP Secretary General Barrister Salam Talukdar at a hurriedly-called press conference at the National Press Club Tuesday announced the decisions and turmed them as "historic" because none like those were taken before.

The BNP has set a "new example" he said and called upon all opposition political parties to show gestures so that the fledgling democracy could be firmly rooted.
