
The leader of the delegation hoped that the existing friendly relations would be further strengthened in the coming days between the two countries.

Cooperation in new areas with Lanka proposed

The visiting Sri Lankan trade delegation on Wednesday exchanged views with the members of Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DCCI) on matters of bilateral trade and investment promo-

PB Weerasekara, leader of the Sri Lankan team, suggested at the meeting with the DCCI members at the conference room of the Chamber that the two sides could explore ways for increasing bilateral cooperation in new areas like tea and human resources development.

He expressed the hope that the trade relationship between the two countries would be much closer in the future.

He stated that the government of Sri Lanka had taken up a number of measures to activate the private sector investment. In this connection, he mentioned the free trade zones in Sri Lanka.

The leader of the visiting delegation observed that Sri Lanka had greater opportunities for export to Bangladesh as it had a wider variety of goods. He proposed for exchanging views between the chamber and trade bodies of the two countries to find new

areas of cooperation. Single country exhibitions of goods in both the countries wold also promote trade, he observed. Alfred K David, the High Commissioner of Sri Lanka in Bangladesh who also addressed the meeting said there is possibility of expanding trade in spices, coconut oil and gem stones between the countries. He added that joint venture enterprises could be set up in Sri Lankan Free Trade Zone in tea packaging sub-sector.

The High Commissioner expressed the hope that the proposed federation of SAARC Chamber of Commerce would help expand trade between the SAARC member countries.

Earlier, Mahbubur Rahman, president of the DCCI said the trade flow between Bangladesh and Sri Lanka had not increased to a desired level in the past. He observed that the present trade flow was also unstable. He stated that the reason behind the poor trading was the similarity of requirement of both the countries in the field of import and export.The DCCl president stressed the need for joint efforts to expand and diversify the pattern of trade and in

clude new items and commodities in the least of exchange. Mahbubur Rahman observed that Sri Lanka can import items like jute bags, jute pulps, newsprint, paper, synthetic textiles from Bangladesh. He proposed the feasibility study to set-up a cement plant in Colombo under joint collaboration on a buy-back arrangement. He also said that rubber based industries including automobile tyres for local consumption as well as for export to either country or overseas could be set up in Dhaka or in Colombo on joint venture basis.

The DCCI chief suggested joint venture enterprises in such fields as tea blending, producing tea bags, coir products, fruits and vegetable processing and canning. Mahbubur Rahman proposed to reactivate the agreement for joint chamber between the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industries and the Ceylon Chamber for developing more business commu nication.

The meeting was also addressed by local entrepreneurs, T Hossain and SK Chowdhury.

Ctg tea market sluggish

Prices eased further as demand continued to be low resulting in large withdrawals at the weekly tea auction sale held in Chittagong on Tuesday

According to a Unity Brokers market report. continued weak demands led to most well made brokens to remain unsold. Although buy ers for Iran resumed purchase, they held lower limits in the absence of any competition. It is presumed that Poland's private sector has started to operate in this centre. Buyers for Iran. Egypt and local traders operated for fannings, prices for which were generally

dearer. About 26,524 packages of leaf were on offer at the sale (No.18). Sale No. 19 on September 10 will comprise of about 26,500 packages of leaf and 4,500 packages of dust

CTC: Most good brokens remained unsold as bids were much below expectations and where sold, were heavily discounted. Medium and plainer brokens, however, met with a better market and these sold at around last week's rates. Few selective lines of brokens sold between Taka 50 and Taka 54. Fannings were in good demand and prices were generally firm to often a little dearer. Selective best lines sold at between Taka 52 and

Taka 55.90.

Dust: 4,156 packages were offered and these generally sold at about a Taka below last

Green tea: 470 packages were on offer. Few, lines of primaries sold between Taka 64 and Taka 67.70 which a handful of secondaries realised between Taka 42 and Taka 47.

Others remained unsold. About sixty per cent of leaf tea on offer remained unsold, and, where sold, export accounted for 27 per cent and internal buyers accounted for 13 per cent of the sale. In the dust category 37 per cent remained unsold and export buyers accounted for 18 per cent and internal buyers accounted for 45 per cent of the sale.

The top price, realised in

the Unity Brokers catalogue at the sale, was CTC brokens of grade BOP from the Madabpore Gardens and fetched Taka 50.80. CTC fannings of grade OF from the Patrakhola and Madanmohanour gardens sold for Taka 52.30. CTC brokens (cional) of grade BOP from Phulbari Gardens realised Taka 50 and CTC fannings (clonal) of grade OF also from the Phulbart gardens sold for Taka 52.60. CTC dust of grade CHUR from the Daura Cherra gardens sold for Taka 60 and CTC dust (clonal) of grade CD from the Bangladesh Tea Research Institute gardens fetched Taka 69.50.
