NAM has failed to resolve conflicts

ACCRA, Sept 4: Ghana's head of state Jerry Rawlings opened a meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) here today calling on members to step out of the Cold War cra and bring about a new world economic order, reports AFP.

"The nations of the Non-Aligned Movement must ensure that we earn respect as partners in the evolution of this new world order," Flight-Lieutenant Rawlings told the opening session of the NAM's 10th ministerial meeting.

Rawlings, however, blamed NAM countries for mismanaging their economies and southsouth trade as well as failing to resolve internal conflicts.

Rawlings, dressed in his traditional green army fatigues and dark sunglasses, told delegates of the 102-nation organization that with the end of US and Soviet block politics, member countries - most of them from developing countries - should concentrate on economic cooperation so as not to be "marginalised " by the international community.

"The rapprochement between the two superpowers and the crumbling of old alliances have ushered in a new period of unprecedented fluidity and even instability," Rawlings warned, citing recent events in the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia as examples.

needed most from the industrialised world in economic relations was "not charity but fair prices for our products and fair access to international market," Rawlings said.

For his part, Yugoslav Foreign Minister Budimir Loncar, outgoing NAM Chairman, told delegates the meeting was "an opportunity to re- adjust our step and keep abreast of the new realities" facing the world by ushering in a new world order.

had sanctioned Taka six crore to three districts in hill tracts while Taka 20 crore was allotted for rest of the 61 districts. The fund would help generate employment for the people.

But he regretted that the tribal insurgents were obstructing development works and causing sufferings to the people.

When asked, some tribal people particularly the Chakmas said that the granting of autonomy to the district councils would further dampen the activities of the so-called Shantibahini. There were reports in the hill tracts that the rivalry between the different groups of tribal insurgents was taking confrontation course. Jatintriya Badipriya Larma popularly known as Santu Larma and Rupyan Dewan were now facing each other in the hill tracts. They might clash among themselves as frustrawas growing among them due to lingering trouble in the area. Santu Larma's elder brother Manabendra Narayan Larma was killed in an infighting few years back. rented house in Shahzadpur. A total of 40 prosecution witnesses and two defence witnesses were examined during the trial in the Sessions Court.
