NARSINGDI, Sept 27 Property worth about one erore taka, including cotton yarn amounting to Tk 60 lakh, was gutted in a devastating fire at four godowns in the town tonight, reports UNB.

Fighting in Renaissance city

ZAGREB, Sept 27: An outbreak of fighting near the ancient Croatian port of Dubrovník has prompted authorities to appeal for international protection for the walled city's artistic and architectural treasures. Dubrovník is widely considered a jewel of Renaissance and Baroque architecture, but Croatian officials are accusing the army and Serbian nationalists of applying pre-meditated "culturocide" against the monuments, reports AFP.

Iranian Kurds to be repatriated

GENEVA, Sept 27 : The Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees is to repatriate more than 10,000 Iranian Kurds who fled to Iraq, some as long ago as 1979, reports AP.

Badrul Haider claims JP support, seeks votes of BNP MPs

Justice Badrul Haider Chowdhury, a presidential candidate promoted by Awami League, Friday claimed that the Jatiya Party would back him in the poll.

However, when contacted, JP leader Barrister Moudud Ahmed said the party would take decision after September 30, the last date for withdrawal of candidature.

Earlier, Monirul Haque Chowdhury, Secretary of the Jatiya Party Parliamentary Party, hailed the nomination of Justice Chowdhury and termed him as a national consensus candidate.

Justice Chowdhury, talking to The Daily Star, said, both the Awami League and the Jatiya Party would support him. He said he had already started contacting the MPs of different political parties including those of the BNP to win their support. He explained to them that none would lose membership of the Parliament if he voted against the party candidate in the presidential election. Because, he said, Article 70 of the 12th Amendment to the Constitution relating to floor crossing was not applicable to election of the President.

Meanwhile, an executive committee meeting of Awami League Friday hailed the nomination of Justice Chowdhury as a consensus candidate. The meeting is adjourned till 6 pm

But Awami League leadership confided to The Daily Star that there was still doubt whether Badrul Haider Chowdhury would contest the election or withdraw his candidature if he could not con-

firm majority votes. Awami League, which wants it not to go "unchallenged" has decided to wait till the last date of withdrawal. This has also been communicated to Justice Badrul Haider Chowdhury, the party leadership

Justice Chowdhury further said that the Jamaat-e-Islami was also considering the proposal to elect him as a consensus candidate. But they did not give any commitment to him as yet, he said.

When asked Jamaat leader Moulana Mattur Rahman Nizami said that the party had not yet taken any decision.

He, however, indicated that this time Jamaat would prove that "it does not follow any big party." He said that Jamaat would take an absolutely independent stand regarding presidential election.

Justice Chowdhury said that he has also contacted some MPs of the ruling BNP. The BNP MPs who are unhappy because of their exclusion from the cabinet may ignore the party decision, if their membership of the Parliament is not cancelled, he claimed.

BNP sources said that it would convene a meeting of the parliamentary party very soon to discuss the matter.

The Workers Party of Rashed Khan Menon has taken a different stand from the Five Party's decision. The Five-party Alliance on Thursday criticised both the BNP and the Awami League for their failure to come to a consensus. But the Workers Party in a release issued to the press on Friday said that Badrul Haider Chowdhury was a party candidate,

but the Awami League was trying to brand him as an independent candidate which was not fair. Rashed Khan Menon, the only MP of the Five Party Alliance, has left for North Korea. He will return on October 7 to cast his vote in

the presidential election. NDP leader Salahuddin Quader Chowdhury also told that he had not yet decided about the presidential election.

More changes in Foreign Office likely

Some changes are likely in the Foreign Ministry in near future, reports UNB.


Ministry sources said Ambassador Farooq Sobhan is expected to return from Beijing early October to join as Additional Foreign Secretary (Multilateral).

The Ministry is reportedly facing difficulties in finding a suitable replacement of Dr Toufiq Ali, Director General (Economic Affairs), who will soon be leaving to take up his new assignment as Minister in the Embassy in Washington.

Another Foreign Ministry official. Shamsher Mobin Chowdhury, Director General (SAARC), will proceed shortly to Colombo to head the Bangladesh Mission there.

Muhammad Zamir, Director General (Europe), is also expected to leave for Jeddah soon to join the OIC as one of its directors.

Number of female lawmakers falls

GENEVA, Sept 27 : The emergence of democraticallyelected parliaments in Eastern Europe has been accompanied by a sharp drop in the number of female lawmakers in these countries, according to a survey published Friday, reports

The study by the Inter-par liamentary Union said the av erage percentage of women represented in national parliaments worldwide fell to 11 percent in June, down from 12.7 percent in 1989 and 14.6 percent at the start of 1988. In 1975, the figure was 12.5 per-

Formation of 'left front' uncertain

The formation of the much talked about broad-based 'left front' has become uncertain. Differences on what would

be the approach towards the major political parties like BNP and Awami League are now the major problem standing in the way of uniting the left political parties on a single platform.

The front, initiated by the Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB), National Awami Party (NAP-M) and some components of the 5party alliance, was scheduled to be launched on September 25. But it was deferred and ef-
