Political decision needed for solving CHT problem

Justice Abdur Rahman Chowdhury on Monday said that the insurgency problem created by the so-called Shantibahini in Chittagong Hill Tracts was being fuelled by a neighbouring country to destabilise Bangladesh.

He was addressing as chief guest a seminar on *problems of Bangalees and tribals in CHT and present Bangladesh' at the auditorium of the National Press Club.

Among others noted journalist Gias Kamal Chowdhury, Secretary General of Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists (BFUJ) Amanullah Kabir, Dean of the Law Department of Dhaka University Dr Ershadul Bari, **DUCSU Literary Secretary** Niamat Elahi, human rights activist Saiful Islam Dildar, Rahman Mont, Rafiqui Islam and Rezaul Karim Helal addressed the seminar presided over by A K M Moksud Ahmed, editor of the Daily Giri Darpon published from Rangamati.

Moniruzzaman Monir. Deputy Commander of the Muktijoddha Sangsad, Rangamati hill district and Joint Convener of the Chhatra Gana Parishad, a hill districts organisation, presented the key-note paper. Chhatra Gana Parishad organised the semi-

In an oblique reference to India, Justice Chowdhury said "this neighbouring country wants her neighbours to remain unstable and so it creates various troubles inside those countries".

He however said the insurgency problem was a political one and called for concerted efforts inside by the government in cooperation with all political parties and also diplomatic efforts to solve it.

He observed that the Local Government Council Bill for the Chittagong hill districts. passed in Parliament in 1989 has curbed civil rights of the mainland people. As a citizen of Bangladesh one can settle in any part of the country. But this Bill bars one to settle in the hill districts, he said

adding this was contradictory to our Constitution. .

He criticised the role of the Foreign Ministry and said it should take urgent initiative to solve the problem immediately because blood is being shed there.

Gias Kamal Chowdhury said that the issue should be considered from a humanitarian point and be solved through united efforts of the government and all political parties. He was also critical of what he called the shaky role of the Foreign Ministry in handling

Amanullah Kabir said that it was proved that some misled youths were working against the sovercignty of the country at the instigation of a neighbouring country.

As the largest country in the region, India always showed big brotherly attitude" toward her neighbouring countries, the BFUJ Secretary General said. The people including those in the hill districts would never tolerate such attitude. They are peaceloving but would shed blood for country if sovereignty threatened, he added.

He also mentioned that India played such games in Sri Lanka and the Maldives. The Tamil problem would someday be India's, not Sri Lanka's, he

Political decision of the Bangladesh government is needed to solve the problem, he observed.

Dr Ershadul Bari said that the Shantibahini forced the Bangladeshi people to flee their homes to refugee camps in Indian Meghalya and Tripura states where they are detained. It is only because India wants to keep this crisis unsettled, he said.

Moniruzzaman in his paper said that the tribal people were enjoying more facilities than others but they made propaganda that they were deprived. He demanded equal share for the Bengali-speaking people of three hill districts after proper study and investi-

Most of our houses have been kutcha or thatched, she said adding that the structure of most of the rural houses remained so weak that those could not withstand the onslaughts of natural disasters like cyclone and floods.

In urban areas, 65 per cent of the population live in congested slums or in railway stations, footpaths or under the open sky as floating population, she said.

Begum Zia said the country's population is expected to cross the 13 crore, giving the cities and towns to bear additional pressure of two crore more people.

The Prime Minister said her government was aware of the housing problem and determined to solve it to improve the standard of living of the people and accelerate the pace of national progress.

She said this year's World labitat Day has a special significance when the SAARC member countries had also taken up programmes for relieving the plights of the homeless and shelterless.

Observance of the day demonstrates Bangladesh's keenness in resolving the problems of homeless, besides expressing solidarity with the international commitment for creating a better living environment for all shelterless around the world, she added.

Citing United Nations figures, Begum Zia said one fourth of the world's total population remained shelterless.

The UN General Assembly declared the first Monday of October till 2000 AD as World Habitat Day with an objective to creating awareness about the poor state of human habi-

Begum Zia said the government, despite the economy being in a ravaged condition, had taken effective steps to ensure five basic rights of the people as envisaged in the Constitution.

"We have numourous problems, but limited resources", she said adding the government had got assurance of active cooperation from the allies and donor agencies for the removal of the problems.

She also sought the coopcration of all quarters including the educationists, researchers, architects, planners and policy-makers to resolve the country's problems and place the nation on a scat of honour in the world arena.

The Prime Minister also went round different stalls of an exhibition of low-cost housing materials arranged on the occasion at IIBRI.

In his speech Rafiqul Islam Miah said the present democratic government was committed to ensuring improved habitat, safe and permanent home, clean atmosphere, access to safe drinking water and sewerage, garbage disposal and expansion of mass literacy.

Meanwhile Jamaat's Sheikh Ansar Ali who had filed the second case decided not to pursue it following the repeal of the Election of President (amendment) Ordinance.

The Election of President Act, 1991 provides for election through an open ballot by the Members of Parliament.

The Election of President (amendment) Ordinance (repealed subsequently) had sought to treat the election as part of the proceedings of Parliament so that the provisions of Article 70 of the Constitution (against floorcrossing) were applicable. Under this Article an MP is liable to vacate his scat on the charge of floor-crossing.

The petitioners had argued that the provision of open clection would subvert democracy because it was against the concept of election which, they said, essentially meant casting of votes through secret ballot'.

The Election of President Act which provided for election through open ballot was intended to commit mischief. By exposing the voters it would make them vulnerable and as such the MPs would not be able to cast votes on the basis of freedom of conscience. The Act was thus violative of the fundamental rights.

In the supplementary prayers the petitioners submitted that the Secretary of the Election Commission had no authority to call a sitting of the House. Again the Parliament chamber which cannot be used for any purpose other than sessions of the House. The Rules of Procedure of Parliament could not be used for holding election of the President. The sanctity of the chamber would be violated. they argued.

They thus submitted that holding of the election under such a situation would only endanger the constitutional process. Again there was no constitutional compulsion to hold the election on October 8.

Against this Attorney General Aminul Haque that said ballot could be both secret and open. The President of the United States was being elected through open ballot for two hundred years. Open ballot was not violative of fundamental rights because the MPs were to vote under selfimposed restrictions and limi tations. After accepting Article 70 of the Constitution by consensus they could not make such an argument.

He continued, the petitioners were not aggrieved when they filed nomination papers for their candidates on September 25. It was only after the promulgation of the Ordinance that they filed the Writ petitions. The Ordinance had already been repealed. And apprehension could not be the

ground of grievance. He further submitted that the meeting of MPs for the election was called seven days before the date of election after duly consulting the Speaker very much a part of Parliament. Again clection of President was not such an act that could violate the sanctity of the chamber. Otherwise Parliament chambers could not have been used for such election in India and Pakistan.

The Rules of Procedure comprised rules which were applicable only to the proceedings of the Parliament. On the other hand an Act was a law, and as such the latter should take precedence over the former. The Election of President Act 1991 was very much under Article 48 of the Constitution, he said.

The Attorney General concluded his submission by saying that the entire country would suffer from uncertainty if the election was stayed. That would lead to a vacuum. At this stage democracy needed to be nursed, he said.

The Court refrained from making any observations about the merit of the Writ petition but observed that the balance of convenience and inconvenience at this stage was against the petitioners. The Writ petitions will come up for hearing before the regular Bench on re-opening of the Supreme Court on October 20.
