The European Economic Community (EEC) assistance to Bangladesh will give move emphasis on long term plans for rural development and poverty alleviation, reports UNB.

Poverty alleviation will get top priority in its future aid programme in least developed countries like Bangladesh, JP Pronk, leader of the highpower EEC delegation told newsmen at the end of its four-day visit here. .

"As for Bangladesh, we would prefer to assist the government in diminishing poverty as a large segment of the population here still live below

Uproar over Tehri dam as UP quake death toll rises

NEW DELHI. Oct 22 : A devastating earthquake which killed about 800 people on the Himalayan foothills has again focussed attention on a Sovietaided mega-dam being built there over the objections of

seismic experts, reports BSS. Newspapers today joined environmentalists to demand that the Government take a second look at, or even scrap, the proposed three-billion-dollar Tehrt dam, which spectafists say could destroy whole

towns downstream if it bursts. The renewed controversy on the project followed Sunday's pre-dawn tremor measuring 6.1 on the openended Richter Scale which had its epicenter very near the dam site at Tehri, a quakeprone hilly area in Uttar Pradesh state.

"The earthquake has also caused a few cracks in the assumed safety of the Tehrt dam across the river Bhagirathi," said The Tribune in and editorial titled "Scrap Tehri dam."

The daily said until Sunday grim warnings from seismologists about the impact of a quake on the dam 'sounded like so many synthetic watls from a set of Cassandras. Not any more."
