Lendl skips Paris Open

PARIS, Oct 26: Three-time French Open champion Ivan Lendl has withdrawn from the dlrs 2 million Paris Open indoor tennis tournament, organizers announced Friday, reports AP.

Lendl, ranked fifth on the ATP Tour, was suffering from a groin injury following his loss to Czechoslovakia's Petr Korda in the Stockholm Open Thursday, organizers said.

Following other late forfeits, four more players were added directly to the main draw: Carl-Uwe Steeb of Germany. France's Thierry Champion and Australian Todd Woodbridge.

The tournament starts Monday with 22 of the top 25 players in the world competing for a first prize of dirs 270,000. Stefan Edberg and Boris Becker, who have won the last two Paris Opens, are the top two seeds.

ated the chess world for 16 years met in the seventh round of the Interpolis Tilburg tournament on Friday, and after a titanic struggle adjourned on move 61, reports

Reuter. The 158th meeting between world champion Garry Kasparov and ex-world champion Anatoly Karpov came as Kasparov led the tournament after playing some spectacular

Karpov, champion from 1975 for 10 years until he lost to Kasparov, was looking for his first win in seven games.

. It began conventionally enough as a king's Indian defence, with Karpov as white expanding on the queen's side and Kasparov attacking on the king's side. Each neglected defence to

press home their attack. When the tactical dust cleared a fascinating and complex strategic struggle was set, with most of the watching grandmasters favouring Karpov. By move 30 he had three minor pieces for a rook and four pawns.

Karpov, with five draws and a loss at Tilburg, was itching for a win, and pressed on even when observers where convinced a draw was certain. The game resumes today.

Xie a point away from world crown

MANILA, Oct 26: Xie Jun of China goes into the 14th game of the women's World Chess Champions today needing just one more victory to unseat reigning women's chess champion Maya Chiburdanidze of the Soviet Union, reports

Xie defeated Chiburdanidze in the 13th game in this Philippine city late Friday, giving the Chinese challenger 7.5 points against the Georgian's 5.5

The 20-year-old sports student from Beijing now needs only one more victory or draws in the remaining three games in the tournament to topple 31-year-old Chiburdanidze.

If Xie reaches a score of 8.5 in this 16-game tournament, she automatically becomes the new champion, ending not only Chiburdanidze's 13-year reign but the Soviet Union's nearly seven-decade dominance of women's chess.

Xie would become the first Asian ever to win the women's World Chess Championship.

Chiburdanidze, as a reigning champion, needs only to reach a score of eight ahead of Xie to retain her crown.

At the 13th game, the Chinese challenger, playing white, used a Ruy Lopez opening and later exploited a twopawn advantage to threaten Chiburdanidze with a knight and pawn end game, forcing her to resign after 51 moves.

Xie grabbed the lead after the 11th game last week and hung on to it with a draw on the 12th game. Chiburdanidze will be play-

Dutch Grandmaster Jan Timman blitzed his white pieces through Viktor Korchnot's French defence in 25

The 60-year-old Soviet emigre played an ambitious pawn advance on move 10, when observers thought a defensive move would be in order.

Timman shortly afterwards sacrificed a knight for one of the pawns shielding Korchnoi's castled king, and in a devastating assault forced the naked king out into the centre of the board where he was easy mate for checks. British Grandmaster Nigel

Short, as white, impressively beat Gata Kamskyin a 33-move Sicilian desence when the 17-

year-old ran out of time. India's Viswanathan Anand

continued his good run with a 52-move win with black against competition tailender Yevgency Bareyev. They played the Slav varia-

tion of the queen's ganibit declined, and the Soviet player, desperate for points, pushed too hard, playing a double rook sacrifice.

Anand returned one of the rooks for a superior rook against bishop ending.

With five wins in seven games, Anand is looking on good form, experts said. If Kasparov draws, Anand will be breathing down his neck just half a point away.

The 14-round all-play-all tournament lasts until November 4.



Anand does India proud



Now the 21-year-old former junior world champion is in second place in the toughest chess tournament of all time, with only Soviet world champion Garry Kasparov ahead of

With a single point between them, there are eight rounds left for Anand to make his mark.

Anand, rated by his ELO grading of results at number nine in the world, is very much considered a world championship contender in the future. He may be a winner here,

and he is certainly a world championship candidate, Soviet grandmaster Genna Sosonko said. But the tall, bespectacled Anand is modest. "I really think it is quite

sensible that you don't think about it (being world champion) until you are number two in the world. It is more of a dream than an ambition yet, he told Reuter. Kasparov's next defence of his title is likely to be in 1993.

But Anand's dreams of challenging him were rudely shattered in August when he narrowly lost his quarterfinal eliminator in Brussels to exworld champion Anatoly Karpov, despite playing some elegant and exciting chess. On Thursday Anand had his revenge by beating Karpov in a

Graf was pushed in a tight first set by seventh-seeded Lori McNeil of the United States before advancing 7-5, 6-2 while Maleeva fell 6-2, 7-6 (7-3) to unseeded Caterina Lindqvist of Sweden.

Graf will play fifth-seeded Barbara Paulus of Austria in Saturday's semifinals. Paulus advanced when her quarterfinal opponent, No. 4 Nathalie Tauziat, pulled out with a stomach virus.

Third-seeded Zina Garrison faced No. 8 Radka Zrbakova in the other quarter-final match Thursday night.

Graf tried to play an attacking game in the first set against McNeil but was often caught off balance. The German twice lost her serve and only squeezed through on her third set point after 48 minutes of play.

"I was trying to be aggressive in the first set but I think I came to the net too much," Graf said. "It was very frustrating because I either missed or I got passed when I came in (to net). But then in the second set it paid off."

Despite losing her serve at 1-0 in the second set, Graf always looked in control although McNetl's accurate serve and volley play meant that the German had to work hard for her points. "She is a very difficult
