NATO opens doors to East European states

ROME, Nov 8: NATO leaders declared a new era of cooperation in Europe today, offering formal ties to former East European adversaries, but differed sharply on how to deal with the crumbling Soviet Union, reports Reuter.

An eight-page Rome declaration on peace and cooperation, issued on the last morning of a two-day summit, declared: "The peoples of North America and the whole of Europe can now join in a Community of shared values based on freedom, democracy, human rights and the rule of

But the 16 leaders clashed behind closed doors on the Soviet Union, with French President Français Mitterrand accusing the allies of adopting a hectoring tone and doing too little to prevent a disintegration of the Soviet state, offi-

Spanish Prime Minister Felipe Gonazalez also urged support for a central authority,

from a NATO statement which urged all Soviet authorities to respect international law and meet arms control and human rights commitments. A French official said

Mitterrand told the allies "he feels the statement takes far too high a moral tone. He feels much more should be done to support President (Mikhail) Gorbachev and prevent a disintegration of the union.

The summit adopted a new military strategy but the final declaration omitted all mention of proposals the United States, Britain and the Netherlands for a wider world role for NATO in the post-Cold

Asked about her personal initiative to break any stalemate that might have emerged in the SAARC, the Prime Minister said Bangladesh had conceived the idea of SAARC and certainly it would be the task for Dhaka to work for the smooth running of the forum. Asked if she had discussed

the repatriation of the "stranded Pakistanis" from Bangladesh with the Pakistan Prime Minister, Begum Zia said she had told newsmen on her return from Common wealth summit recently that she had discussed the subject with Sharif in Harare.

Answering a question on domestic situation, the Prime Minister said the Sangsad is effective and becoming more and more meaningful day by day.
