Gamal El Amir, Taher's replacement, failed to win a point against Del Harris in the 30-minute match. * Struggling Pakistan lost 2-1



Those yet to arrive include two boys from Saudi Arabia, a boy and a girl from the Republic of Georgia (USSR), two boys and two girls from Egypt and a boy each from Hungary and Austria.

After Bangladesh, India are sending the biggest contingent of 13 boys and four girls while the Thais, who have done well in the past meets here, have entered three boys and five girls. There are two boys and two girls from South Korea and two boys each from Poland and



Liu boosts his Olympic hopes

HONG KONG, Nov 17: China's Liu Jun boosted his Olympic hopes with a surprisingly easy 15-10, 15-10 win over compatriot and defending champion Wu Wenkai in the final of the Hong Kong Open badminton championships on

Sunday, reports Reuter. Liu said his win should improve his world ranking from 12th to eight which, if he maintained that level until the April 30 cut off date, would guarantee him a place in next

year's Barcelona Olympics. Under the International Badminton Federation's qualification rules only two players per country can compete in the men's singles unless a third player is in the top eight when he also becomes eligible

Both Wu and fellow Chinese Zhao Jianhua are already ranked in the top eight and virtually assured of their places which made Liu's victory all the more important.

"Now I've reached number eight I think I can make the Olympics. I will be playing as many tournaments as possible before April 30 to maintain my ranking," Liu said. Wu, ranked third in the

world, made a series of unforced errors which virtually handed his compatriot the match on a plate.

In contrast the all-Chinese women's singles final between world number one Huang Hua and world champion Tang Jiu-Hong was of the highest quality and keenly contested.

Huang, who celebrated her 22nd birthday on Saturday, showed great resolve on her way to a 12-10, 9-12, 12-9 win over her rival.




