We can't spare an inch of land, says Khaleda

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia Wednesday said the prime objective of her government would be to alleviate poverty through rural development and optimum use of national resources, reports

"Not an inch of land can be afforded to spare," she said, stressing maximum utilisation of all available national resources, including the huge population, to turn the country progressive and self-reliant.

Begum Zia said the country cannot remain dependent on foreign aid for ever and urged the experts to assist the government with their practical knowledge and specialisation in respective fields.

'All our development programmes will be meaningless if poverty cannot be alleviated, she said.

The Prime Minister was addressing members of the Task Force, constituted during the previous caretaker government, who called on her at the International Conference Centre Wednesday morning to present its final reports published in four volumes.

The Task Force, composed of 250 local experts headed by Prof Rehman Sobhan and divided into 29 committees; identified various national problems and suggested poli-

cies to resolve them for sustainable development in different sectors ruined by nine years of autocratic rule.

"Government's main objective is rural development for socio-economic progress," Begum Zia said, adding the people had high hopes on the new democratic administra-

"We all have fought unitedly for the independence of this country which is ours - now is time to build it together and steer it towards development."

The Prime Minister thanked the members of the Task Force for taking up such a selfless and important responsibility for preparing the report which can become an example in poor countries like

She assured the best use of the report, expressing her confidence that it will be helpful in the country's development process.

Inadequate safety and protective measures were the primary reasons behind the recent accident at the storm sewer construction site at Panthapath, according to a Water and Sewerage Authority (WASA) investigation report competed last week.

All responsibility for safety and protective measures at the site lies with the foreign consultants implementing the project and the sub-contractor employed by them according to the agreement between WASA and the consultants, the report pointed out. The three-member investigation team lead by a WASA superintendent engineer and two executive engineers found that the construction company failed to take even the minimum level of safety measures for the protection of the workers at the site, a high WASA official preferring anonymity said Wednesday.

DUBROVNIK, Nov 20 Croatians in occupied region have accused Yugoslav army of looting and terror, reports AP. Reuter and AFP.

'Federal forces are carrying away everything that can be carried - possessions, animals, food", municipal authorities told Italian Immigration Minister Margherita Boniver while she was in besteged Dubrovnik awaiting arrival of

an Italian relief ship. The Serb-dominated army denies botting was widespread but dusk-to-dawn notices on walls acknowledge "individual abuses" by soldiers.

Military police interrogators were particularly brutal" clouting prisoners with batons and shoving guns down their throats, others said.

The Yugoslav army

leashed a fierce artillery attack on the eastern Croatian town of Osijek today as the 13th ceasefire of the Yugoslav conflict crumbled, Zagreb Radio reported.

It said villages on the southern outskirts of the town were also being hit in attacks which killed two people and wounded seven.

Ostjek is 30 km (20 miles) northeast of Vukovar which fell to the Serbian-led federal army this week after a three-month
