Lamba's 3rd ton earns Abahani a date with Mohammedans

Abahani arranged that appointment with a convincing 136-runs win over Gulshan Youth in yesterday's second Dhaka semifinal at the Stadium, a match that turned out as much of an anti-climax - if not more - as the previ ous day's mis-match between defending champions Mohammedans and last year's runners-up Greater Mymensingh Cricket Club (GMCC) by the flattering margin of eight wickets.

Once again, Abahani owed their facile passage to their openers Zahid Razzak Masoom and Raman Lamba who gave them yet another dream start by putting on 169 runs before being separated in the 33rd

Yet, despite Masoom's role in that imposing stand, it was really the batting of Abahani's star acquisition Raman Lamba who rattled up his third hundred in five outings that took the stuffing out of the youthful Gulshan Youth attack.

Lamba, a former Indian international who still harbours hopes of barging into the Indian Test team — a hope that provides him the motivation to keep going in this game lambasted the Guishan bowlers by hammering an unbeaten 137 runs that included eleven scorching boundaries and three towering sixes. Lamba's was an electrifying,


run-a-ball innings that came off 137 deliveries. His fifty took 74 deliveries in 115 minutes but the second fifty came off another 53 deliveries.

Lamba's run of scores in this year's Damal meet has already begun to resemble Bradmanesque proportions. In the first group match against newcomers Ajax Sporting Lamba hit an unbeaten 110 with Masoom making 116; in

No other Abahani bowler — and eight of them tried turning their arm over yesterday - managed more than one scalp.

Gulshan skipper Manju, a former Bangladesh opener and wicket-keeper who these days prefers to bowl instead of donning the gloves, was made to ponder the wisdom of his decision when in the 40th over of the Abahani innings Lamba savaged him for 18 runs in one over - dispatching him for two majestic sixes over long-on and another crisp four to boot.

Masoom, whose own fine run with the bat so far this scason has brought him plenty of runs, thereby erasing some of the bitter memories of last season with reigning Navana Premier Division champions Brothers Union, was eclipsed yesterday by Lamba's fireworks despite making a polished 66. Relishing his role as a fellow-opener with the dashing

Indian, Masoom hit five fours in his 91-ball stay, his fifty coming off 78 deliveries. And he, too, followed up his feat with the bat by picking up a Gulshan wicket.

Abahani skipper Farooque made 24 before being bowled by Rupam when the score was 209 in the 39th over.

The burly Akram Khan then joined Lamba in the run chase and remained not out with 17 when the harassed Gulshan bowlers finally completed the 44th over in the time specifled for 45.

Rupam's solitary success with the ball cost him 46 runs while Sohail, who claimed Masoom's wicket, gave away 18 runs in his two overs. Manju conceded 72 runs off the eight overs he had dared to send down in the face of the Lamba onslaught.

Going in to bat, the Gulshan Youths adopted a rather negative attitude. Realising well that they just didn't possess the potential to launch into a chase after the mammoth Abahani total, the Gulshan batsmen decided upon holding on to their wickets no matter how slow or inconsequential the run rate.

This they achieved with some degree of success, finishing on a miserly 126 for the loss of six wickets when their 44-over quota ended.

No amount of inducements by Abahani bowlers could entice the Gulshan batsmen into attacking shots and they remained content to keep their shutters down.

Rupam top scored with an unbeaten 55 with four fours while opener Iftekhar with 13 and Babul at number six with 18 were the only others to reach double figures. There were 26 runs by way of extras.

Fitness woes worry Pak selectors

KARACHI, Nov 26: The injurymarred Pakistan team's dismal performance against the West Indies has alarmed selectors,

commentators are concerned about the squads prospects in the upcoming World Cup in Australia and New Zealand, reports AFP. Pakistan were Tipped to do

well against the West Indies after winning the three-nation Sharjah Cup last month, but they made a bad start to the three one-day series, losing the opening match to the tourists.

They managed to tie the second after a hard struggle time Pakistan's prospects in but surrendered the last match as well as the series two-nil.

The crowd amply demonstrated its frustration when in the penultimate over four Pakistani batsmen, playing one ball each, were out without adding a run to their side's paltry 175 for six against the visitors' 205 in the 4- overs each match.

Sensing defeat, fans threw plastic cushions, tossed bottles and empty juice cartons on to ground, forcing West Indies mid-wicket fielder Keith Arthurton to call for a helmet.

The series exposed the fitness problem Pakistan has been facing for some months, former selector Haseem Ahsan said, and the swelling list of injured players in posing a serious threat.

"Pakistan must find a quick replacement for its top batting lineup, Javed Minadad, Zahid Fazal, Ejaz Ahmed and Saeed Anwar," he added.

Marsh's ton in WA victory

ADELAIED, Australia, Nov 26: Australian vice-captain Geoff Marsh hit a century to steer Western Australia to a seven wicket victory over South Australia on the fourth and final day of their Sheffield Shield cricket match on Monday, reports Reuter.

Opener Marsh struck 104 as Western Australia reached their victory target of 303 with 3.5 overs of their minimum 96 to spare.

Test reject Tom Moody, who scored 168 in the first innings, added an unbeaten 54 while off-spinner Tim May picked up the only two wickets to fall to the South Australian bowlers. Earlier acting South Australian captain Anderw Hilditch declared the home side's innings closed at the overnight total of 180 for

The win pushed Western Australia in to third place in the Sheffield Shield table behind Queensland and Victoria.

Zahid suffered a shoulder injury while attempting a catch from West Indies captain Richie Richardson at Karachi, and a similar problem with Ejaz has prevented him displaying his best skill as a batsman in the last two seasons.

Saeed joined the team in Sharjah on Imran Khan's SOS for the crucial final against Indian, but he too was injured while fielding there. But the injury to Miandad,

one of the greatest batsmen in the world with more than 8,000 runs in 109 Test matches, has caused the most disappointment.

Cricket experts consider that if he does not recover in the World Cup will be dampened, despite some promising new finds.

"Miandad is suffering from too much cricket and I think it is in his own interest that he

should be absolutely fit before going out in the field," Haseeb said, adding that "We don't want to lose such an experienced played due to strain of

Visibly concerned, Pakistan captain Imran Khan said there was a conscnsus that Miandad should work under medical supervision to improve his overall fitness.

His remarks gave rise to speculation that Miandad might not play against Sri

Lanka who will open their three one-day match tour here on December 8. Last week Miandad was

seen nursing his back trouble with a special thermal belt to keep the pain under control. He was dropped in the third and final Test against the

West Indies at Lahore in December last year and only played in the first of the three

against them.

Imran Khan himself, who celebrated his 40th birthday three days ago, also appears not to have returned to his full form after an absence of nearly a vear from international and domestic cricket.

The renowned fast bowler was hit by the West Indian opening batsman Philo Wallace for a towering six and a four in his very first over of the match at Faisalabad, which the West Indies won by 17 runs to

clinch the series. "It seems they are left with no option but to field newcomers in the pre-World Cup eseries against Sri Lanka, should they wish to improve their run-chasing capacity," former manager Salahuddin Ahmed said.

"We hope many of our star players would recover, by the time the Sri Lankans arrive here in December," he said.



As envisaged in my last write-up, the Pakistan sojourn of the Caribbean cricke-

ters did present some exciting cricket. The West Indians won the threematch series convincingly 2-0, and it could have been three nil as well but for the second match which ended in a tie under the World Cup rules agreed upon for series. No one can complain that

excitement and thrills were wanting among the full-houses Gaddafi Stadium spectators, who must have returned home having watched one of the most enthralling encounters. Staunch Pakistani supporters may have despaired at Mushtaque not getting the second run off the last ball of the match, but the real connoisseurs of the game must have felt satisfied; cricket at its best was on display, the competition was breath-takingly keen.

In the first match at Karachi the West Indians achieved rather easy 24 run victory. Batting first, they compiled 170 for the loss of six wickets in 34 overs and Pakistan could manage only 146 for the loss of all their wickets with one ball remaining. Hooper with his gentle spin captured 4 for 34.

But all excitement was reserved for the second match. Having been put in, the West Indians compiled 186 for five in 39 overs. In reply, Pakistan started steadily but found it difficult to force the pace and

at one stage the visitors looked like coasting home in comfort. Even when ljaz after having put on 47 runs in a partnership with Imran, was out for 27 (117 for 5), the Windies were in command of the situa-

Imran, on 22 at that point, was joined by Wasim Akram. They were together for some time and at the end of the

The drama in the last over bowled by Curtly Ambrose had all the elements of greatness: Pakistan needed 10 in 6 balls, Moin Khan was out in the third ball, Wagar took a four and a single off the 4th and 5th balls, Mustaque had to get 2 off the last ball for victory but having pushed the ball to midon, could only complete the first run and in his desperate attempt for the winning run was run out.

In the third match at Faisalabad the West Indies registered an emphatic victory, the margin of 17 runs not really telling the correct story.

After being put in again, the West Indians compiled 204 for 5 in 40 overs and the asking rate for Pakistan was 5.1. The Pakistani openers

could hardly take any liberty. The first wicket fell at 65 in the 20th over and at that point the asking rate had risen to 7.00 and it kept going further up to 7.9 at the end of the 30th over.
