WASHINGTON, Dec 14 Only in India and Bangladesh are the news media "most free" Freedom House, which monitors the state of freedom around the world, says in its latest annual report, says PII.

In Bhutan, says Freedom House, the media is "partly free" while in Maldives Pakistan and Sri Lanka, it is "least free". Freedom House says that

restrictions on the media decreased in many countries in 1991. A significant exception to this trend was that the news media were "stringently controlled" for 40 days during the war against Iraq, but most Americans, when policd, approved wartime consorship and even after the fighting stopped.
