

Hasina calls on Shahabuddin

Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina, accompanied by the party General Secretary Begum Sajeda Chowdhury, met the Acting President, Mr Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed, in Dhaka on Saturday and protested the arrest of Mr Kader Siddiqi.

During the meeting Sheikh Hasina who is also the leader of the Eight-Party Alliance, reiterated her party's claim that the conviction of Mr Kader Siddiqi by a Martial Law Court in 1978 was illegal.

She further said that it was inconsistent with reason and sense of patriotism that the valiant freedom fighter like Kader Siddiqi be put into jail, she said, adding while the killers of Bangabandhu were allowed to roam about freely.

Sheikh Hasina demanded immediate release of Mr Siddiqi.

The Acting President explained the legal aspects of the matter to the Awami League leader.

'Hit on Israel a dilemma for Bush'

NICOSIA, Jan 19: Iraq said today its missile assaults on Israel had posed the biggest political and military dilemma for US President George Bush that he had ever faced, reports Reuters.

It said that Iraq's missiles would wreck the allied coalition facing Baghdad.

In Algiers, the Iraqi Charge D'Affaires said Baghdad had launched 19 missiles against Israel and the attacks would continue. He said one missile hit the Defence Ministry in Tel Aviv.

The dilemma into which Bush has fallen after Iraq hit the Zionist entity with missiles is more difficult than any military or political dilemma Bush has ever faced, especially as he was adamant in showing Israel was not involved in his aggression on Iraq...." it said.

It is certain that Bush has confessed to himself only that his aggression on Iraq has been completely defeated... his weak coalition will be wiped out and melted by the Iraqi missiles and their burning fires," it said.

Rift deepens

Reports from Cairo say: Iraqi missile strikes on Israel deepened a rift in the Muslim world with the public in many countries jubilant at the attack on an old enemy, but Arab allies in the US-led anti-Iraq coalition holding firm.

From Mauritania to Pakistan and from Niger to Sudan hundreds of thousands of demonstrators took to the streets on Friday and today, hailing the assault on the Jewish state and denouncing the US-led bombing of Iraq and occupied Kuwait.

But Egypt, Syria and Arab Gulf states with troops in the multinational force confronting Iraq stood by their commitment to the alliance.

Street protests, biggest in Algeria where an estimated half a million people demonstrated peacefully across the

country, turned violent in Karachi, Pakistan, and Nouakchott, Mauritania, with police firing tear gas to break up anti-American marches.

Western and Arab officials had forecast that a war with Iraq would unleash a wave of anti-western violence in Muslim countries and possibly attacks by pro-Iraqi guerrillas in Europe.

Palestinian guerrilla groups have called for attacks on Western interests and a radical Palestinian leader today predicted a long war.

Australia, America

In Australia, Sydney police said, at least 10,000 protesters, chanting "No blood for oil" and "bring the frigates home" marched on the U.S. and Israeli consulates Saturday.

Similar marches were staged in Canberra, Adelaide, Brisbane and Hobart in what organisers said were Australia's biggest peace

marches since the Vietnam War.

Protesters took to the streets across the United States and Canada during Friday with more than 150 arrests in the Californian cities of Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Germany

Away, tens of thousands of German took to the streets on Friday to protest against the Gulf war while others stopped work and held silent vigils.

In Berlin, more than 10,000 children with candles and banners crammed the main Kurfuerstendamm shopping avenue.

Earlier, several hundred people blockaded the inner city motorway and brought rush-hour commuters to a standstill. There was a similar action on a busy bridge over the Rhine in Cologne.

Berlin Railway staff halted their underground and suburban trains for several minutes.

Bush's bodyguards

measures to ensure free polls. The proposals included repeal of the Special Powers Act, 1974, release of all party candidates including the party chairman and former president, Ershad so that they can participate in election campaign, withdrawal of warrants of arrest against party leaders, announcement of a code of conduct for election, recovery of illegal arms, and equal publicity of all political parties over radio and television.

In the afternoon while addressing an adjourned meeting of the Working Committee of Jatiya Party, Mizan Chowdhury asked all party workers to launch election campaign. He also asked them to help maintain law and order in their respective areas. He said, JP is an established political party of the country and it has supporters at the grassroots level.

It may be mentioned that Jatiya Party earlier named 266 party candidates where it did not mention the name of former president Ershad. Before the announcement of the list of the party candidates, many of them were not even consulted by the party leaders. The JP leaders, when contacted, could not say how many candidates actually submitted their nomination papers. A Party source said, many of their candidates are now contesting the election independently due to adverse political situation.

reinforced concrete shelter in Tel Aviv and below a crater 2.5 metres (eight feet) deep and seven metres (25 feet) across in the ground.

Three people were taken from here to hospital for shock," he said.

ABC said one missile crashed into the heart of Tel Aviv near the Defence Ministry.

CBS news correspondent Tom Fenton said there were four blasts in Tel Aviv and seven in Jerusalem and that he saw smoke to the north of Tel Aviv.

The Pentagon said three missiles were fired at Israel from western Iraq Saturday. The White House said President George Bush, at his Camp David retreat, was awakened and told of the latest attack.

Air-raid sirens heralded the morning barrage and sent

Israelis hurrying into sealed rooms to don gas masks against possible chemical agents.

Saturday's missile attack came on the Jewish Sabbath, a day after Iraqi missiles hit Tel Aviv and Haifa, injuring a dozen people.

Israel, which earlier had threatened to strike back for any attack, did not immediately, retaliate. But officials reiterated Defence Minister Moshe Aren's warning after the first attack that the country would respond.

The United States and its allies had urged Israeli restraint following Friday's attack, to preserve Arab involvement. US has expressed concern that Israeli involvement could split Arab countries in the anti-Iraq coalition.

Patriot' for Israel

AFP reports from New York

The United States has sent Israel two batteries of advanced Patriot air defence missiles capable of knocking out Iraqi missiles that have eluded allied bombing raids and hit Israel, the New York Times reported Saturday.

Washington is also sending technicians to assemble the launchers quickly and teach the Israelis how to use them, the newspaper reported, quoting military officials.

Proposed hartal at Tangail withdrawn

The proposed day-long hartal, which was called by the Kader Siddiqi Repatriation Committee at Tangail was withdrawn because of Bishwa Ijtema.

The hartal call was given to protest the arrest of Kader Siddiqi, who is contesting the parliament election from Tangail-8.

Kader Siddiqi was arrested Thursday from Jhenidah under the Special Powers Act. He has been sent to Jessore Central Jail and put under 120 days detention.

He was served with a body warrant as he was convicted by a Martial Law Court in 1978 and sentenced to seven years R.I including a fine of Taka three lakh on charge of high treason.

Kader Siddiqi's nomination paper was submitted from his home district and it was accepted by the Returning Officer as no one challenged his candidature.

According to the people representation order, no convicted person is allowed to contest the election. But, a source in the Election Commission, which is maintaining silence over the issue, told The Daily Star that his nomination paper remains valid till the election is held because there is no provision to cancel the accepted nomination paper. However, the source said anyone can challenge the election before the election tribunal to be formed after the polls, if he is declared elected.

US psychological campaign

NEW YORK, Jan 19: The United States is waging a psychological campaign that includes broadcasting anti-Government propaganda into Iraq and a plan to smuggle radios in so Iraqis can pick up American transmissions. The New York Times said, in a report from Washington that the campaign, which the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) had been authorised to join, was designed to shake Iraq's confidence, undermine its military and deceive its leaders about US military intentions, reports Reuter.

Gaddafi leads protests

TUNIS, Jan 19: Libyan leader Colonel Muammar Gaddafi led anti-war protests in Libya on Saturday which the state News Agency Jana said were attended by one million people. Jana said demonstrations took place in Tripoli and in several other Libyan cities and towns. Gaddafi led a big demonstration in the Libyan capital, reports Reuter.

Mines floating off Bahrain

BAHRAIN, Jan 19: The U.S. navy warned merchant ships on Saturday they entered the Gulf at their own risk after mines were confirmed floating off Bahrain and were reported off the United Arab Emirates, reports Reuter.

Bomb scare at Dubai bank

DUBAI, Jan 19: The Dubai headquarters of Citibank was evacuated Saturday after a telephoned bomb threat. An eye-witness saw no evidence of any explosion and said sniffer dogs were combed the site, a modern angular glass and concrete building near the central business district of this Gulf port. Citibank is a unit of New York based Citicorp, reports Reuter.

US diplomats leave Lebanon

BEIRUT, Jan 19: American diplomats in Lebanon have left the country, fearing an Arab backlash because of Gulf war. Security sources said on Friday Ambassador Ryan Crocker and his staff flew to Cyprus by helicopter after Palestinian and Arab extremist groups threatened to attack US interests to avoid air strikes by the US-led coalition on Iraq, reports Reuter.

Blast kills four in Pakistan

RAWALPINDI, Jan 19: At least four people were killed and more than 47 injured in a bomb explosion at a local cinema house Saturday, police sources said. All the wounded were admitted to hospital and four were in serious condition, hospital sources said, reports AFP.

Reporters attacked in Amman

AMMAN, Jan 19: An Italian journalists was in hospital on Friday after he and four colleagues were attacked by a large crowd of pro-Iraq youths, one of the group said. Television reporter Lilli Gruber said the five Italians were punched, kicked and spat at when they went on Thursday to Jordanian Army Reserve Headquarters to report on youths trying to sign up for duty after the US-led bombing raids on Iraq, reports Reuter.

Ten killed in Kashmir

Srinagar, Jan 19: Paramilitary police shot and killed 10 civilians in Jammu-Kashmir Saturday when their vehicle was ambushed by Muslim militants, witnesses said. But police officials said four civilians, including a woman, were killed and 10 others seriously wounded in crossfire between paramilitary troops and Kashmiri militants in Srinagar, reports AP.

Riyadh normal

Bangladeshis are working now. The ambassador said people in the Eastern Province were panicky before the war began. Since nothing has happened so far, the situation is gradually returning to normal in the vulnerable zone, he said.

Kazi Golam Dastagir said the situation in Jeddah, Makkah, Medina and Yanbu was completely normal as these places are out of Iraqi missile range.

BSS adds: About 10,000 foreigners have crossed into Jordan from Iraq and Kuwait after the outbreak of the war in the Gulf and an unspecified number of Bangladeshis are among them. Additional Foreign Secretary Reaz Rahman told newsmen on Saturday.

However, he said, the number of Bangladeshis was presumably small because most of these foreigners were from Iraq and hardly 250 to 350 Bangladeshis were in Iraq when the war began.

Mr Rahman said the government was in constant touch with Bangladesh missions in the Gulf countries and latest reports spoke of no casualties of Bangladeshis anywhere in Iraq.

Our troops in Saudi Arabia are safe," he said, adding that the Foreign Ministry was in touch with the concerned officials in charge of the troops.
