
The district witnessed a construction boom in the recent years to cope with the rising population..

Erosion of the rivers Meghna, Brah maputra, and Dhanu also dev oured hundreds of acres of land during last ten years. Roads have also been constructed further reducing agricultural lanci.

With the decentralisation of administration. 13 upazila complexes have been constructed on a large areas of agricultural land causing crop loss of lakhs of taka.
