If you put a simple question to a city dweller as to what attracts him most in the metropolis, one probable answer you might get in

mosques' Dhaka is popularly known as "The city of Mosques," the appellation being that from time immemorial, there have been numerous mosques built by different rulers. During it's existence for nearly 500 years ago, the city has witnessed the erection of above one thousand mosques. The number is increasing with an expansion of the city day by day.

Very little can be said of mosques constructed in Dhaka before it became the Mughal capital in 1610 A.D. with the name Jahangirnagar The earliest pre-Mughal mosque in Dhaka can be found in Narinda area (part of old Dhaka). According to an inscription fixed on the entrance of the mosque, it was built by Bakht Binat daughter of Marhamat in 1457 A. D. This single domed mosque has lost many of it's features because of much reno-

Historians say, the Mughal governnors. officials and nobility had graced the city by erecting a large number of mosques. These brick-built mosques were generally three and occasionally one or five domed. They depict ed a uniform imperial style of architecture. The traditional terra cotta surface decoration was substituted by plastered panels.

Shaestakhan, who had the privilege of staying in Dhaka for nearly a quarter of a century in the 17th century, deserves the credit for building many mosques. The most renowned among them is the 'Satgambuj' mosque, literally meaning, a seven domed mosque. Actually the mosque has three domes.

During this period, two other 3 domed mosques were built. One is the mosque of Haji Khwaja Shahbaj near the Highcourt building and the other stands on the premises of the Lalbagh Fort.


'AL govt provided food to crores'

In recent times, the one which has attracted the attention of visitors is the Tara mosque meaning the star mosque. This is the most highly decorated mosque in Dhaka and situated on the western side of the Armanitola High School. Built by Mirza Ghulam Pir in early 18th century, this mosque was a simple construction with three domes and no decoration. A rich merchant in 1940s added imported Japanese and English China clay tiles for it's surface ornamentation. In 1987, the mosque was expanded with two more domes.

> With more than 85 percent of the population being Muslims, the building of mosques is a regular matter. The capital city is just a focal point of such activities. Mosques are erected, sometimes planned sometimes spontaneously by the people. The believer with his religious mind is ready to offer prayer anywhere he likes without any hesitation. According to the scriptures,"the merit of constructing a mosque in this world is assured to be repaid in the next

In this continuous process, a number of new mosques have been built in Dhaka in recent years with new building materials and technologies. In the late 60s came up three such mosques, namely. the Dhaka University Jame Mosque, the Gulshan Jame Mosque and the Baitul Mokarram

Mosque. The Baitul Mokarram Mosque which gives the impression of the Holy Kaaba is without any minaret unlike other mosques in the city. It's seven storeyed prayer chamber can be entered from the one each from the northern and southern sides. Situated on the roof of a huge shopping complex, the mosque is an outstanding attraction of the city where thousands of devotees pray five times everyday.

Bangladesh Shilpa Kristi Sangsad has organised a discussion and prize distribution ceremony at 4 p.m. on Tuesday to commemorate the 178th death anniversary of Haji Mohammad Mohsin.

Justice Abdur Rahman Chowdhury will be the chief guest at the discussion to be held at Soviet Cultural Centre auditorium.

Presided over by Dr. Mohammad Maniruzzaman, the discussion will be addressed by poet Asad Chowdhury, Mahbub Anam, Major (retd) Ali Hassan Quereshi, Sabih-ul-Alam, Harunar Rashid Khan Monnu, Magfur Uddin Ahmed Amanullah Kabir, and M. A. Kabir.

The discussion will be followed by a prize-giving ceremony and a cultural function.

The project submitted in May last year for setting up a disposable razor factory with imported waste films looked very attractive on the surface since it involved only (Taka three million) about US 90 thousand dollars in investment, but promised to save the country (Taka 288 million) over 847 thousand US dollars in foreign exchange a year. The industry was to earn a pretax net profit of Taka 108 million annually. A half of the investment was to be in foreign cur-

About five million pieces of disposable razor would have been produced and 2400 kilograms of silver recovered from the industry a year, the entrepreneur had promised. In his application he had also indicated that his 'principal in Finland had already sent the 'machinery and raw materials' for the industry which was to start production in August 1990 and that he needed a registration as early as possi-

The Department of Environment (DOE), the official environmental watchdog giving environmental clearances to new industrial projects raised scrious objections on the plea that import of wastes was prohibited. It pointed out that the entrepreneur's plan to import waste films in sealed drums might be a trick to hoodwink customs inspectors It raised the question why used or exposed films would have to be brought in scaled drums. DOE also asked how the applicant could start shipment of waste films without prior permission and requested BOI to seek and explanation from him. DOE warned that an industrial registration granted for the proposed project might give international hazardous waste traders a cover to dump such

cargo on Bangladesh. Again even though the entrepreneur had sought registration for setting up a disposable razor factory, the details of the project proposal showed

about 823 thousand US dollars from recovered silver and only slightly more than 28 thousand dollars from razors.

The news media took up the issue. Following this an other local entrepreneur who was awaiting bank loan for his own disposable razor factory project explained that such an industry cannot be set up by investing only US 90 thousand dollars. His actual investment excluding the cost of a building to house the factory, because he owns a building in an industrial area in Dhaka would be many times more than that amount

Experts also pointed out that disposable razors are made of a plastic grade called styrine and not cellulose used for manufacturing films. Cost of cellulose is higher. They said even cellulose recovered from waste films would be at least three times costlier than that of fresh styrine.

Experts also said silver is present in waste films only in a trace form, one can recover only 100 grams of the metal from as high as one ton of used films. Moreover, the waste that would be generated during the process of recovery of cellulose and silver from used films would also be toxic and create

problems of safe disposal. Against this backdrop BOI requested the entrepreneur to reformulate his project proposal so that the industry could be operated with used films available locally. The entrepreneur failed to comply. He told BOI officials it was impossible for him to collect used films from thousands of studies, therapeutic and industrial x-ray units scattered all over Bangladesh. BOI officials finally said

there was no scope to consider the application for granting industrial registration. They felt that the proposed industrial project posed serious health risks to the people because films (proposed to be imported) are not biodegradable, and import of such cargo in huge quantities would only add to the degradation of the

BOI officials said Bangladesh is now much more aware than anytime in the past of the machinations of international hazardous waste traders to dump such cargo on poor countries. They do it by promising easy money because dumping of hazardous wastes has become very costly in the West BOI officials pointed out that before the organised campaigns of 1988-89 Bangladesh was not aware of secret

dumping of industrial wastes.

BOI, however, has not taken any action against the entrepreneur for agreeing to take shipment of waste films from Finland by violating a government ban. Said an official, as an organisation meant for promoting industrial invest-ment by providing registration and helping organise other support services from under a single roof, BOI prefers not to do the police function of taking the entrepreneur to the court. BOI has written to the Ministry of Commerce. It is upto the Department of Customs to take up the question of the import of banned items with the en-

But none could tell for sure where did the raw materials (waste films) shipped by the entrepreneur's principal in Finland lie. The entrepreneur only tried to draw sympathies from BOI officials saying he would incur loss if registration was refused because he had already brought in the machin-

trepreneur, he added.

Wintry chill again

Weather will remain mainly dry with cloudy sky over Dhaka and Rajshahi Divisions till Wednesday morning but tight rain or thunder showers is likely to occur at one or two places over Khulna and Chittagong Divisions, metercological Department says. On Monday, rain or thunder showers occurred at most

places over Dhaka, Chittagong, Rajshahi and Khulna Divisions. Rainfall recorded at Feni, Faridpur, Khulna and Dhaka were 5 cm, 2 cm, and .5 cm respectively. But at Rajshahi, Ishurdi, Jessore and Barisal the rainfall were recorded at one centimetre cach. The night temperature remained nearly unchanged on

Monday over the country except Dhaka, Mymcnsingh, Tangail, Faridpur and Bogra where it fell by two to three degree Celsius which were above normal by two to six degree Celsius. The night temperature on Tuesday is likely to fall by one to three degree Celsius over the country.


Outlook for subsequent two days: little change. Extended outlook for another five days: no appreciable change.



Yet another bid to import hazardous wastes foiled

Bangladesh has stopped another attempt to import industrial wastes into her territories. The Board of Investment (BOI) of the government has refused industrial registration to a project which, its applicant said, was to be based on imported waste films.

Import of wastes is banned in Bangladesh. But an entrepreneur had managed to seek an industrial registration from BOI by showing he was attracting foreign investment as a cover.

The entrepreneur who took Bangladeshi citizenship four years ago sought to set up a disposable razor factory, as there was no such factory in the country. Waste films to be imported from Finland was to be used not only as raw materials for producing disposable razors but also for recovery of

The refusal to grant industrial registration to the project marks the fending off of attempts to import wastes into the country for the second time in two and a half years. Earlier in 1988-89 an attempt to import hazardous industrial wastes in the name of setting up a plant for cheaper power generation for a caustic soda and industrial salt plant was foiled following strong campaigns by the news media, sci entists, academics and citizen
