

A jail source told The Daily Star Friday night that the former president Ershad, Roushan Ershad and their son are being provided with food three times a day entitled to a prisoner having division.

Moscow calls it deliberate destruction of Iraqi residential areas

NICOSIA, Feb 8 : Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Belonogov criticised today what he said was the deliberate destruction of Iraqi residential areas by Allied air raids, the Iranian news agency

IRNA reported, states Reuter. "Iraq's civilian population should not be brought to miscry. Unfortunately, civilians have suffered great harm." The agency quoted Belonogov as saying before ending a threeday visit to Tehran.

"Deliberate destruction of Iraqi residential areas can not fulfill the tasks set by the United Nations security resolution," Belonogov added.

Iran, too, has said intensive

allied air raids on Iraq overstep the authority given by Sccurity Council resolution 678 for the use of all necessary means to drive Iraqi forces out of Kuwait.

Belonogov, who held talks with Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Velayati and other Iranian officials, said Tehran and Moscow had indentical views on the need for a quick halt to the Gulf war. Belonogov was due to fly to


