KISHOREGANJ

Son kills mother

February 14 : Mother was killed by her son following an altercation over serving food on Saturday.

Osman (26) of Telipar village under Kishoreganj hit his mother Amena Begum (50) with dao when Amena failed to serve him food as there was no rice in their house. Amena died on the spot.

The body was brought to Kishoreganj hospital for autopsy. A case was registered with police.

3 dacoits arrested

Katiadi thana police arrested three dacoits and recovered two firearms and ten rounds of ammunitions from them on Monday.

Police pounded a group of ten dacoits near Betori Mosque on Kishoreganj-Bhatrab highway while they were preparing for dacoity. Police arrested Abdul Hamid, Habib and Abdur Rahman and recovered the arms from them.

Other dacoits managed to escape. They opened two rounds of fire at the police.

The arrested persons are fugitive as there are several dacoity cases against them in Gazipur, Dhaka and Mymensingh districts.

Officer-in-charge of Katiadi thana Asish Kumar Das was slightly injured during exchange of fire with the dacoits.

Professionals' democracy march ends

Five examinees jailed for adopting unfair means

February 14 : Five degree examinees have been awarded imprisonment for different terms for taking answer scripts with them and threatening the Magistrate on duty at the examination hall, reports UNB.

The judgements were pronounced by the Sadar Upazila Magistrate at his court recently. Sudharam police submitted charge sheets against them.

Mosharaf Hossain (Roll-44451), Subrata Das (Roll-44448), Sajjad Hossain (Roll-44447) and Mahabubul Alam (Roll-44450) did not submit the scripts and took them outside the examination hall. They were later caught red-handed by police. They were awarded two months' imprisonment each.

Mohammad Shafiqul Islam, who threatened the Magistrate for not allowing him to copy, was expelled and later awarded three months' imprisonment.

Text books available in blackmarkets

February 14 : One month of the current academic session has passed but secondary students are yet not received the text books, reports UNB.

Book traders said the new text books would not be made available till the old stocks were exhausted.

According to students, the books are available in blackmarkets at exorbitant prices.

Buyers alleged that traders had been adopting this technique to make windfall profit.

In addition, flaws in the government distribution system has aggravated the problem.

The guardians have urged the authorities to ensure smooth supply of books at fair prices immediately. They also demanded punishment of the book traders who are allegedly involved in selling books at blackmarkets.

JHENIDAH, Feb 14 : Jhenidah police recovered Indian goods worth about Taka 22,000 on Wednesday last.

250 eye patients operated upon

TK 19 cr smuggled goods recovered in Dinajpur last year

RAJSHAHI, Feb. 14 : The Jawans of Bangladesh Rifles recovered a huge quantity of smuggled goods worth about Taka 18 crore 94 lakhs and 58 thousand from different border areas in Rajshahi district last year. In all 4,86,000 cases were registered and over 1000 alleged smugglers were arrested during the period.

Bangladesh Rifles men recovered Indian clothes, cattle-head, stainless steel materials, cosmetics, sugar, motor parts, cycle parts while those entering into Bangladesh. The incoming Indian goods seized during the period valued at about Taka 16,960,000.

The goods seized while being smuggled out of the country included VCR, VCP, shirts, fish, old garments and jute worth about Taka 2,84,97,000.

Population Day observed

The National Population Day was observed here in a befitting manner under the joint auspices of the District Family Planning Department and Voluntary Family Welfare Association.

A big procession participated by officials, doctors and family planning assistants, paraded the main streets with banners and placards inserting slogans on population control to create awareness among the public.

A seminar was held in local Zila Parishad auditorium with Mr. Saifuzzaman, Deputy Commissioner of Rajshahi District, while Afasuruddin Molla, Divisional Director of Family Planning Department attended the function as chief guest.

Speakers at the meeting stressed the need for reducing the present rate of population growth for overall development and urged the officials of the concerned department to put in their best efforts to transform family planning programme into social movement in order to control population explosion.

Reports of sporadic clashes among rival political workers have been received from different parts of the country during the last one week.

Seven persons were hurt at Bera, four km from Khulna town on Tuesday when gunmen opened fire on a peace procession. The procession was brought out jointly by the local units of Awami League, BNP, Muslim League and CPB.

Local groups of activists also clashed at Cox's Bazar on Tuesday night. At least 13 persons were injured in the incident.

Fund shortage delays flood control plan

MAULVI BAZAR, Feb 14 : The Hamamichhara flood control and drainage scheme in Chandnighat union under Maulvibazar Sadar Upazila taken up by the Water Development Board in the 1982-83 financial year at an estimated cost of Taka one crore has not yet been implemented.

Flood damaged crops in this area every year during monsoon. The last flood water of the Monu and Dholai rivers inundated the entire area including Bashthola, Shamerkuna and Matarkapton.

The non-availability of allotted fund is stated to be the cause of delay in the execution of the scheme.

With the implementation of the scheme 7,000 acres of agricultural land will be saved from flood and 5000 acres of land will get irrigation facilities.
