Bullock shortage

Acute shortage of bullocks has been prevailing throughout the district causing serious obstacle to cultivation.

According to informed sources, 60 to 70 per cent families have no bullocks to till their lands due to which vast area of land remain fallow every year. Most of the farmers perform their agricultural work on share basis as they can not afford to purchase bul locks due to sharp rise in prices.

At present a pair of bullocks cost Take 10.000 to 12,000. Finding no other alternative they till their land with spades and other implements. Many of them even use milch cows to cultivate the land resulting in gradual reduction in the production of milk. Moreover various diseases take a heavy toll of cattle every year.

Besides, slaughtering of bullocks has increased to a great extent following the scarcity of fish in the markets.

Shortage of doctors, medicines hampers treatment

February 16: The 50-bed district hospital is beset with manifold problems due to lack of blood bank, shortage of medicines, doctors and accommodation, reports UNB.

According to informed sources, many emergency pa tients from far flung areas are to go back disappointed with out any medical attention.

The number of doctors is also too small to cope with the rush of the patients. It is alleged that many do not attend their patients in time.

Sufferers say most of the time they are to buy medicines from outside at exorbitan: prices.

Surgical patients are the worst-sufferers due to lack of blood bank and appropriate instruments, it is alleged.

Moreover, patients are packed like sardines on floors and verandah of the hospital because of bed shortage.

Local people urged the concerned authorities to turn the hospital into a properly equipped 100-bed one to cope with the rising needs of the patients

1600 power pumps to be distributed


COX'S BAZAR

Bridge damaged in '71 awaits reconstruction

MAULVI BAZAR, Feb 16: The Chandnighat Bridge over the river Monu which was damaged during the War of Liberation still awaits reconstruction.

This is a vital bridge on Maulvi Bazar-Kulaura Juri Road which connects Maulvi Bazar district headquarters with Baralekha, Kulaura, Rajnagar upazilas and a part of Sadar upazila. The bridge was

constructed during the British rule and a part of the bridge was damaged during the War of Liberation causing much sufferings to the vehicular traffic and the passersby.

The Roads and Highways Department, however, restored communication by installing Bailey bridge on the damaged portion of the bridge. And every year a huge amount of money is spent for repair and maintenance work.

It is learnt that the authority concerned has taken up a scheme to reconstruct the bridge. And in this connection a survey was made long before. But for want of proper fund the scheme has not yet been implemented.

The local people expect the authority will do needful for early reconstruction of the bridge.

JAMALPUR, Feb 16: Ashek Mahmud Government College, a prestigious institution of the district has been plagued with manifold problems like short age of teacher, classrooms, illequipped laboratory and li-

It is learnt that many posts of teachers are lying vacant since long. Only 52 teachers are not doing justice to such a large number of students on the roll.

This year the college carned a unique distinction and one student stood first in the B. Sc. examination held under Dhaka University despite limited laboratory facilities. There are only three laboratory rooms which can hardly accommodate Science students. The Science students has been doubled after the introduction of B.Sc. course.

Moreover, the classrooms congenial for having snacks are so congested that it is because of the dirty environhardly sufficient for 50 students. But over 80 students are

On the other hand, accommodation for teachers is not provided in the campus. They live in rented houses which eat up a substantial portion of their salary.

Teachers expect the government to provide them with necessary facilities so that they could teach the students with peaceful mind.

Moreover, a famous institution of the district has no transport facilities available for the staff and students.

People of the area feel that the concerned authorities should take steps on urgent basis regarding the overall development of the institution.

Treatment is hampered due to absence of medical officers and nursing staff who are now working on deputation to Pabna General Hospital.

Due to shortage of drugs, the patients are not provided with necessary medicines.

Moreover, patients complained that poor vitamin and mal-nutritious diet is being supplied to the patients.

On the other hand, campus and wards remain very dirty emitting bad odour all the time. Cattle, dogs, and cats move freely in the wards round the clock.
