WASHINGTON, Feb 19 President George Bush today rejected a Soviet proposal for ending the Gulf war, saying it falls well short of what would

be required', reports AFP.

Mr. Bush did not reveal details of the Soviet plan. which was carried from Moscow to Baghdad today by Iraqi Foreign Minister Tareq Aziz. But he said he had seen the proposal and given his reaction to Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

"As far as I'm concerned. there are no negotiations. there will be no concessions. Mr. Bush said at the start of a meeting in the White House with Congressional leaders.

Of the Soviet proposal, he said: "Very candidly, and I've been frank with [Mr. Gorbachev) on this, while expressing appreciation for sending it to us, it falls well short of what would be required."

Moscow sent details of its peace proposal to Washington on Monday but requested that they be kept confidential pending a response from Baghdad.

Earlier today White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said discussions concerning the Soviet proposal were continuing among US officials "but there's nothing new at this point."

A Pentagon official said the war in the Gulf was proceeding on schedule 'as though those talks were non-existent."

Reuter reports from Moscow: Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev is expecting a reply from Iraq within the next two days to his plan for peace in the Gulf.

But the spokesman, Karen Karagezyen said, no time limit had been set for Baghdad to react to the proposal, presented on Monday by Gorbachev to Iraqi Foreign Minister Tareo Aziz.

There was no fixed time. But we expect a response in the coming days-in one day or two. That is logical, of course," said Karagezyan, a deputy to chief presidential to the Iraqi capital, while diplomatic sources there said he was expected to head back to Moscow within hours.

65 civilian, 179 military targets bombed

NICOSIA, Feb 19: A senior Iraqi official said more than 20,000 Iraqis were killed and 60,000 wounded in the first 26 days of the Gulf War, an iranian newspaper reported Tuesday, states AP.

The state-run Tehran daily Jomhuri Islami said Iraq's Deputy Prime Minister, Saadoun Hammadi, reported those figures to Iran's first Deputy Foreign Minister, Ali Mohammed Besharati, during talks last week.

The newspaper also said Besharati said Hammadi estimated that Allied air raids had inflicted 200 billion Dollars in damage on Iraq since the war began.

An Iraqi military communique broadcast by Baghdad Radio Tuesday said Allied air raids hit 65 civilian targets and 179 military targets in 24 hours. It said the "barbaric raids" had not demoralised tha lraqi public.

In the war zone, Allied forces worked on land, sea and air to strip Iraqi forces of the will and the means to fight, setting the stage for a swift and flerce assault.

Special security for cities

A high-level meeting with Acting President Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed in the chair on Tuesday reviewed further the security arrangements for the parliamentary election in order to make it fool-proof, reports BSS.

The meeting, held at he President's Secretariat, decided to deploy special BDR reinforcement in four metropolitan cities in addition to mobile security units in every upazila, pourasabha and metropolitan city. The mobile units would act under the supervision of a Magistrate in the event of any untoward incident during the elections for restor-

ing discipline. It was further decided that all private automobiles, including motor cycles, would be prohibited from approaching within 400 yards of polling

The Acting President told the meeting that the mobile forces would have no role in the election process, but would act under the supervision of a Magistrate to bring order if the situation goes out of control of the local security teams comprising armed police and armed Ansars. These teams would be placed under the Presiding Officers and act as directed by them.

He said the relevant laws and rules have been modified to provide for stern punishment of any official, candidate and voter found guilty of an election offence. Justice Shahabuddin also

made it clear that neither Presiding Officers nor Polling Officers would be able to escape punishment for any, malpractice in the elections. "Let it be known" he said. "election rigging by compelling Presiding Officers or by capturing polling centres with muscle power will confer no benefit to any candidate". The Acting President said
