Surja Tarun made full use of the placid track when they were asked to bat first.



New breed threaten old guard



SEVILLE(Spain). Mar 12: A new wave of young talent, hungry for success and eager

to take on the old guard, emerged to shake up the established hierarchy of the track at the world indoor athletics championships, reports Reuter.

American Andre Cason and Irina Sergeyeva of the Soviet Union, both only 22, set the pattern by winning the men's and women's 60 metres finals on the opening day of the three-day meeting on Friday.

Their shock victories over entrenehed favourites Linford Christic of Britain and Jamaican Merlene Ottcy, both 30, sounded a warning that the old order may be changing.

With the world outdoor championships in Tokyo less than six months away and the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona drawing nearer, some track veterans may be forced to scale down their ambitions.

Christic received a second jolt in the 200 metres when he came off second best to yet another 22-year-old, the powerfully built Bulgarian Nikolai

" It was my dream to beat Christie. He's a great sprinter," said the star-struck newcomer. But generally the new gen-

There were five outright world indoor records at the meeting with reunited Germany claiming brilliant wins in the men's and women's 4x400 metres relays, thanks to magnificent anchor legs from Thomas Schoenlebe and Grit Breuer. Mikhail Schennikov of the




