The joint statement mentioned that regarding the debt relief, State, Treasury, Agriculture, OMB and AID have agreed in principle to write off Bangladesh's development assistance debt (about 292 million dollars), which has already been communicated to the interim government.

The joint statement said due to recent political developments in Bangladesh followed by voluntary evacuation of some USAID staff had complicated the administration of AID projects there but still the programme had not been stopped. The statement praised the effort of the interim government for its responsive role to the security of the US nationals in Bangladesh.

The statement added that the debt relief would signal their strong support for Bangladesh's moves toward democracy and economic reforms and would encourage Bangladesh to continue the course of economic reforms as outlined in its IMF Enhanced Structural Adjustment Facility.

About the effectiveness of the USAID programmes in Bangladesh the joint statement pointed out restructuring of the fertilizer distribution system in Bangladesh and greater access to fertilizer that has been widely recognised as a pre-requisite for increasing food production by small farmers. The statement added, as a result of deregulating fertilizer prices and markets, distribution and sales of fertilizer to farmers through private dealers have increased supplies, dramatically and the sales had grown by 20 per cent since 1989, farm level prices decreased by 10 per cent in 1990 and the private market shares grown to 90 per cent for urea and 98 per cent for gypsum by 1990.

Crop production and most notably rice production grew by 18 per cent in 1990 over the previous year. In addition to the millions of small farm households which have benefited from this restructuring, some 50,000 private retailers of fertilizer and the agricultural

Mitterrand, who said the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO) remained the legitimate representative for Palestinians, did not rule out useful contacts with other Palestinians and such as those US Secretary of State James Baker had in talks in Jerusalem this week.

"The PLO still appears as the representative organisation. There are, doubtless, other forces too, and I think they should make themselves known about the situation as it is right now," he said.

Israel refuses to consider any contacts with the PLO. Bush said he felt the PLO destroyed its credibility by siding with Saddam in the Gulf war and anticipated other moves by Palestinians not necessarily beholden to the PLO. "We'll pursue that track for a while and just see how the healing process goes", he said. "There's got to be discussion with Palestinians or you're not going to get this problem solved".

Bush declined to comment on whether Baker's talks with the leaders of Saudi Arabia and Kuwait might achieve a concession toward Israel.

"I am not about to say that the Saudis and the Kuwaitis were not forthcoming and if you're ever going to accomplish something, regrettably what's discussed with them must be kept confidential", he said.

Bush left Martinique for Bermuda where he was to hold similar talks tomorrow with British Prime Minister John Major.

The joint statement made it clear that to achieve the strategic objectives of the USAID it focuses on three-pronged approach. These are: strengthening the private sector and the role of business in development, maximizing sustained GDP growth; supporting democratic pluralism and strengthening democratic institutions to maximize economic, social and political benefits for a broader range of citizen groups and targeting the role of the family as a development focus in project design and impact measurement.

The statement also said that the USAID was closely working with the American private sector to bring their essential capital to the developing countries in South Asia.

The fiscal year 1992 request of 299 million dollars (DA, ESF and PL 480) for Bangladesh, India, Nepal and Sri Lanka represents a modest increase from 1991.

None of these countries has a 1992 request lower than its current 1991 level.

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of the just concluded parliamentary elections were not so much encouraging for the presidential polls, because in 1979 the party secured 44 per cent of the total votes cast. Several dozen district level leaders who also spoke at the meeting called for dissolution of upazilas and holding of fresh elections to union parishes.

They also suggested that the ministers of the would-be BNP government and MPs should work in also cooperation with the local party workers in implementing development programmes.

country's economy, education, agriculture, industry and other related institutions which suffered extensive damage by the autocratic rule of Ershad.

Begum Zia took serious note of the defeat of her party in many seats during the polls and said BNP had incurred such failure due to the violation of party rules and discipline by the leaders and workers.

She asked all to strictly follow the party discipline and work with renewed pledge to strengthen the BNP's organisational basis.

This is not the time to sit idle but work harder to put the party on a solid footing, Begum Zia told the packed audience calling upon them to go to their respective areas and collect new members making the party a well-organised and ideal one.

The autocrat snatched away power in the darkness of night but the people elected us in the broad daylight, she said reminding the party leaders and workers that they have to work unitedly as members of a single family in the interest of the country's development.

"This is not the time to rejoice the election victory but to prepare ourselves to face the tough time ahead," Begum Zia told her partymen reminding that the enemies of BNP would have no stone unturned to tarnish the image of this popular party.

Gandhi mausoleum stormed

NEW DELHI, Mar 15 : Workers from a political party stormed the mausoleum of Indian independence leader Mohandas "Mahatma" Gandhi and blocked streets and forced their way into office as they rallied here today, reports AFP.

Dozens of members of the Bahujan Samaj (Equality) Party (BSP) doused the eternal flame at the Rajghat memorial during a brawl with police and smashed parts of the mausoleum ahead of the rally officers said.

The memorial, one of New Delhi's landmarks, was closed to the public following the damage.

BSP workers also smashed a box meant for cash donations and tore up concrete slabs from the heavily-guarded mausoleum after curators at the complex ordered them to enter without their footwear, a Hindutva sign of respect to the dead.

Eleven rallyists were arrested after officers beat back most of them following a 30-minute scuffle, police said. Several constables were hurt as the rallyists pelted them with missiles uprooted from

the mausoleum.

Police cordoned off the BSP marchers who arrived in the national capital to celebrate the birth anniversary of the late B. R. Ambedkar, who espoused the cause of the poor whom the party claims to represent.

But they later blocked central New Delhi roads triggering traffic jams, police and witnesses said.

They would not even allow critical people to cross roads and go to hospitals, said the city's traffic police chief Maxwell Parreira adding the marchers also stopped government motorbikes and schoolbuses to protest the incident at the Gandhi mausoleum.

The Congress (I) party of former Premier Rajiv Gandhi criticised the storming of the Gandhi mausoleum as "an act of sacrilege, and said people should condemn such attacks."

The government after Awami League kept the treaty in force and supported it. By keeping the Special Powers Act, the subsequent governments detained thousands of people and repressed them.

Dr. Kamal said the rightist forces formed a solid alliance against Awami League. BNP and Jamaat formed electoral alliance in 150 seats. Hong Kong lifts ban on Kuwaiti assets

HONG KONG, Mar 15: Hong Kong has lifted all restrictions imposed on Kuwaiti assets effective immediately, a government spokesman said today. The freeze on Iraqi assets remains in place. The British colony, through an order from London, imposed the restrictions on August 7, five days after Iraqi tanks rolled into Kuwait, reports Reuter.

Israel bombs Palestinian base

CHITOURA, Mar 15: Israeli warplanes blasted a Palestinian guerrilla base in Syrian-controlled east Lebanon on Friday, and police said seven guerrillas were wounded. A police spokesman, who cannot be named in line with regulations, said the planes targeted a base manned by Libyan-backed guerrillas of Samir Ghosheh's Palestine Popular Struggle Front in the Bekaa Valley, reports AP.

18 injured in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, Mar 15: At least 18 people were stabbed and beaten after a gang armed with knives and clubs attacked passengers on a moving commuter train. The train Thursday headed to the black township of Soweto outside Johannesburg. Press reports said scores of terrified people jumped from the train when it stopped at a station. The attackers escaped and police said they had no information on the men or the motive for the attack, but it appeared linked to black faction fighting, reports AP.

IOC summit in Madagascar

ANTANANARIVO, Mar 15: Heads of states and governments from Indian Ocean countries gathered in Madagascar today for a weekend summit on boosting regional cooperation. Officials said issues on the agenda included a plan for free exchange of information among the five members of the Indian Ocean Commission (IOC) — Madagascar, Mauritius, the Seychelles, the Comoro Islands and the French overseas territory of reunion, reports Reuter.

UN to help Albania to hold polls

VIENNA, Mar 15: The United Nations has offered to help Albania organise multi-party elections later this month and control a mass exodus of refugees, the official ATA news agency said today. A visiting UN delegation had agreed to a request from the communist authorities to send technical advisers for the elections of March 31, reports Reuter.

Arafat to remain PLO chief

NEW YORK, Mar 15: Yasser Arafat has vowed to remain Chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organisation and said he and PLO are "more popular than ever" despite their support for Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein during the Gulf war, reports Reuter.

Referring to the controversy over AL leadership, Sheikh Hasina clearly said, "We have become leaders as we have been working with AL, which has a glorious past of 42 years and led the nation in the War of Independence. If any of us is isolated from the party, he will lose all his importance."
