# Inclement weather slows relief operations: Relief ships run aground:

## Communication with many affected areas yet to be established

Star Report

While woes of the survivors of Monday's cyclone and tidal bore are multiplying with each result, ships and motor day passing, a vigorous relief operation still remains a far cry. Squabbles between the local public leaders and the government functionaries. both of whom appear determined to take the lead have made the formation of relief committees difficult in many of the badly ravaged upazilas and unions in the offshore islands.

Inclement weather which has been persisting for the last three days has slowed the progress in airborne relief operations. The rivers are not

navigable due to submerged vessels and other objects. As a launches fail to carry relief goods to offshore islands. A large number of cargo vessels and patrol boats belonging to Bangladesh' Inland Water Transport Authority (BITWA) which were sent for relief and rescue operations now remain stranded at Choukighat under Daulatkhan of Bhola district. A pilot of an IWTA vessel told The Daily Star on Sunday that it was uncertain as to how long it would take for making the

waterways navigable. Our staff correspondent Sved Issa writes from Bhola : with Deputy Commissioner. With the recovery of 27 more Bhola left for Dhalchar on bodies, official death toll in Sunday braving the inclement Manpura upazila rose to 115. Fifteen trawlers went to the deep sea before a day of the cyclone with 1500 fishermen aboard. Only two returned and the rest were missing. The relatives of the missing people are crowding the upazila headquarters to know their whereabouts. There was fresh rain on Sunday which aggravated the miseries of the affected people. Communication with Dhalchar, a remote offshore island, could not be established as yet. A relief team

Several vessels belonging to BIWTA plying on Barisal-Dhaka and Khulna routes ran aground at Choukighat. Three naval patrol boats, three oil tankers one coastal ship and one tug have been grounded. The waterways will require more time to be navigable, sources said.

A spokesman of the Cyclone Preparedness Programme told The Daily Star that 4,000 more bodies were recovered in Hativa island and death toll mounted to 7331 in the island.

#### Polluted environment makes survival unbearable From Moinuddin Naser Anjuman sources said that

CHITTAGONG, May 5: The after effects of the April 29 **NEWS BRIEFS** cyclone are proving no less devastating than the havoc wrought Monday night by the storm in this port city. Sharif's departure

Absence of almost all civic. amenities coupled with badly polluted environment have made the lives of the survivors most miserable. There is no electricity in most areas of the metropolis and water supply

remains largely disrupted. The City Corporation workers, most of whom were themselves affected, cannot give much time to cleaning the city of the debris and rotting

Even in the suburbs and rural areas, people are having to drink badly contaminated water, risking diarrhoea and a host of other water-borne

Almost every pond, river, canal and well has been badly polluted by the tidal surge. The scale of the relief

operation mounted so far has been nowhere near matching the requirement.

The most overriding need of the hour is to clear the city areas of rotting carcasses of both humans and animals. This correspondent found

the whole environment of the city most unhealthy with a heavy stanch of decomposing bodies vitiating the air. The people of Sandwip,

Kutubdia and the coastal areas of Chittagong are having to breathe in a most putrid, nauseating stench. Efforts to recover the

carcasses have been so inadequate that many of the affected city areas are yet to be searched by he rescue operators and cleaners. The Chittagong City Corporation sweepers

remained the only workforce

still trying to find out and dis-

pose of the decomposing bodies with a helping hand from the Anjuman-i-Mufidul Islam, a humanitarian organisation that engages in the disposal of unclaimed bodies.

Each four-man team of sweepers has been scouring city and suburbs for carcasses. The leader of one such

team told this correspondent that they had recovered 71 bodies from just a one mile stretch along the Patenga sea beach in the three days following the disaster.

He said a complete combing operation will need atleast another week.

is anybody's guess. On Friday last this reporter saw at least 50 carcasses north of the Patenga naval base.

The air over the city has been rendered heavy not only by the stench from corpses and animal carcasses but also by the rotting rice, pulses, and other perishable foods in the different godowns of the city markets.
