

Canadians may sue IBF

COPENHAGEN. May 11: Canadian officials at the World Championships are considering suing the International Badminton Federation (IBF) in the continuing row over the defeat of their women's singles player Deng Si-an.

Such legal action is believed to be unprecedented in the sport, but the Canadians are incensed at the circumstances of Chinese-born Deng's third round defeat by Denmark's Pernille Nedergaard on Wednesday.

The Dane spent several minutes in the second game receiving treatment from her physiotherapist for severe cramp, despite a rule saying no team official is allowed on court during the match.


