Population in Bangladesh will rise to 23.50 crore in the year 2025, according to this year's state of world population report by the UNFPA.

The report revealed Monday in Dhaka says, the world population in the same year will increase to 850,4 crore and in the year 2050 it

will reach 1000 crore. The assumption was made considering that the women worldwide would have, on an average, about two children each by the year

2035, according to the report. The report estimated the average growth rate in Bangladesh at 2.7 per cent during 1990-95. According to the report, birth rate per 1000 people in 1990 was 41 while the death rate per 100 was only 14. The infant mortality per 1000 in the year was 108. the fertility per woman was 5.1 in 1990, the report said.

## Marxist leading Bhattarai in Kathmandu
