Dr. Ahmed Sharif, eye specialist and former director of National Institute of Ophthalmology died infected Hepatitis B -virus at PG Hospital in Dhaka on Wednesday afternoon. He was 57, reports BSS.

He left behind his wife and only son Dr. Ahmed Jamil Sharif.

His Namaz-e-Janaza will be held at Bakshibazar Mosque at 11 am and at Lions Bhaban, Agargaon at 12 noon. The last Namaz-e-Janaza will be held at Baitul Mukarram mosque after Zohr prayer.

Dr. Ahmed Sharif, who retired from active service on_ January 1 this year, was a professor of Ophthalmology in Dhaka Medical College. Chittagong Medical College, Raishahi Medical College, Sylhet Medical College, IPGMR and National Institute of Ophthalmology. He was activity involved with various national international and organisations.

Dr. Sharif was also the District Governor of Lions International District-315A.

Born in Maddham Sakpura village of Boalkhali upazila under Chittagong district in 1934 . Dr Sharif had his MBBS from Dhaka Medical College in 1957, joined government service in 1957 and had his FRCS degree from London in



Jiang in Moscow to sign border pact

Communist Party leader Jiang Zemin was beginning a five-day official visit here today designed to cement the new relationship which has developed between the communist giants since President Mikhail Gorbachev's ground-breaking visit to Beijing two years ago.

reports AFP. Jiang is the first Chinese party leader to visit the Soviet Union since Mao Zedong in 1957, just ahead of an ideological rift between the two countries which boiled over in the early 1960's and 1970's into armed border clashes.

On Thursday, the Chinese and Soviet delegations will sign an agreement to settle the dispute along the eastern part of the 7,300 kilometer (4,400 mile) long border. Negotiations are still continuing regarding the western part of the border. "The objective of this visit is

to further promote the development of the good neighbourly relations between the two countries," Jiang told a pre-departure press conference in Beijing. Asked about possible con-

MOSCOW, May 15: Chinese crete results from his talks, Jiang replied: "Our two countries share a long border. This time we may sign an agreement on the eastern part of the Sino-Soviet border.

China's top leaders, including President Yang Shangkun. Vice President Wang Zhen and Premier Li Peng were at the airport to see Jiang off.

Jiang, who is also scheduled to go to Leningrad, was accompanied by a large delegation including Foreign Minis ter Oian Qichen, Defence Minister Qun Jiwei, Trade Minister Li Langing and the head of the Communist Party Central Committee's International Liasion Department, Zhu Liang.

Jiang, who worked in the Stalin Automobile Plant in Moscow 35 years ago, said he considered himself an "old friend of the Soviet people". and was 'very happy' to be returning to the Soviet Union.

Jiang and Gorbachev were to hold an initial round of talks at the Kremlin Wednesday afternoon after the official welcoming ceremony at the Kremlin's Saint Georges' Hall.

The Joint Task Force spokesman Lt Col Jim Vance told UNB that the two C-130 transport aircraft on Wednesday flew three sorties each and carried people and goods to the coastal operational areas.

About 7.000-man Task Force, including some Gulf war veterans, was diverted from the Indian Ocean on their way

The specific mission of the Force was to provide heli-

copter and landing craft lift support for distribution of food, water and relief supplies. It will also provide priority

relief assessment teams to the stricken areas and furnish manpower and technical expertise in specific relief projects, the release added. BSS adds: The focus of the

relief operations by the US Task Force in the cyclone affected areas would be on works like ferrying relief materials in the inaccessible areas and services to health sector, a Foreign Office spokesman said on Wednesday.

He said the Task Force was expected to stay for two weeks, during which it would provide emergency relief assistances to the lakhs of affected people.

Some members of the Task Force like the water purification units and the small helicopters would stay back to continue the relief operations. the spokesman said.

The discussion at times led to heated exchange of words over interpretation of the joint declaration of November 19 of three political alliances which stood for a sovereign paritament and an accountable government.

Over fifty MPs took part in the discussion on the concluding day.

Participating in the discussions. Deputy Leader of the Opposition Abdus Samad Azad called upon the Treasury Bench to sit with the opposition to evolve ways and means to remove the constitutional

Dr. Khandakar Mosharraf Hossain State Minister for Energy and Mineral Resources, said, the question of the form of government will be decided through mutual exchange of ideas, adjustment and under-

standing. Zamiruddin Sircar, State Minister for Land told the House that US troops had come to Bangladesh to carry out relief and rehabilitation activities. They will work under Bangladesh authorities.

BNP member Matin Chowdhury made a strong plea for continuing the presidential system of government which, he said, was needed for stabilities and prosperity. He argued that presidential system was suited to the needs of Bangladesh. Under parliamentary system Deputy Speaker Shahid Ali had to sacrifice his life, while the Abu Hossain Sarker Ministry in erstwhile East Pakistan could not be stable, he said adding Presidential system brought in stability and prosperity under

Khandaker Delwar Hossain. chief Whip of BNP, said that the government was aware of the terms of the Joint Declaration of the three alliances. He reminded the Opposition that the people had given mandate to BNP and none else. Presidential system was introduced by Awami League, he said, urging all to work with the spirit of cooperation. worst natural calamity. Whatever may have been the reason, the move was not well

advised, to put it mildly. She appeared to give a wrong signal that she is not interested in what is going on in the parliament, or worse.

that she does not care. She has been inaccessible to the House and has unnecessarily given an impression of aloofness and of being distant from the elected representa-

tives of the people. In addition to giving such wrong impressions (I say so being fully convinced that she is too much of an astute politician to underestimate the importance of the Parliament) she lost a marvelous opportunity to appear before the nation with her catalogue of achievements in dealing with the natural disaster and also with her vision for the immediate future for the reconstruc-

tion of the country. Her speech before the highest seat of legislature, depicting what she plans to do in the short and long term future would have gone a long way in further strengthening her image as a leader. It would have also contributed greatly in meeting public expectation that we have a government, clear in its mind, as to what needs to be done at this critical juncture of our national life.

But in place of all this, we had a void. As the first session of the post-autocracy parliament came to a close there was a tremendous sense of achievement among all the members for having brought about a truly

representative Parliament and see it functioning - however unsatisfactorily. It appeared to be in everybody's mind that the parliament itself was the most glorious symbol of the victory over autoeracy and that this symbol - the House of the People - will have to be strengthened and projected in

every way possible. If nothing else, the 40-day session proved that we have some superb speakers in the House. They were eloquent, to the point and a treat to hear. Among others some were a bit too theatrical, some too emotional, and some others down

right comical. Too many speakers wasted their time.

During yesterday's proceedings the most harassed person was the Honourable Speaker himself. He had to take over the microphone repeatedly to force speakers to respect the agreed time limit.

What, however, can be said of most of our parliamentarians is that they seem to be blissfully unaware that they have a very sensitive public address system at their disposal and that there was absolutely no need to strain their vocal cords as they did.

Not only are our parliamen-

tarians irrepressible speakers. one. Amanullah Chowdhury of Jatiya Party, turned out to be a singer of some talent. After saying a few words in

the Parliament yesterday he suddenly started singing. So well rehearsed did he sound. that I was convinced it was all planned and I started looking around for that talented MP who would suddenly take out his tabla (or dhol) from under his desk and start playing.

My eyes naturally fell on the ladies present and I half expected one to spring up and give us a dance performance. I am all for music. But be-

fore Chowdhury and the likes of him turn our Parliament into an entertainment club. think his friends should find a place for him to sing somewhere outside, and thereby spare the Parliament this sorry spectacle.

State of Emergency in Tskhinvali

MOSCOW, May 15: The Georgian legislature has declared a state of emergency and night-long curfew to the South Ossetian city of Tskhinvali to curb ethnic violence. Tass news agency, quoting the local news agency Sakinform, said the declaration was published Wednesday after being adopted by the Georgian Supreme Soviet Tuesday. The emergency was imposed for one month, and the curfew will be in effect from 5 pm to 7 am daily. Soviet Interior Ministry troops have been on patrol in Tskhinvali for the past six weeks following the outbreak of violence between Georgians and South Ossetiaos. At least 65 people have been killed in the battle, reports AP.

Racial riots in Brussels

BRUSSELS. May 15: Racial riots erupted overnight in two neighbourhoods of suburban Brussels, the fourth night of unrest by poor immigrants in five days, police reported Wednesday. Police said brief fighting took place Tuesday night in Molenbeck, week of the capital, and in Saint-Josse to the northeast. There were no arrests or injured reported and damage was described as minor. More serious disturbances occurred Friday. Saturday and Sunday nights in forest, an immigrant suburb southwest of Brussels where four people were arrested and about 20 injured, reports AP.

Pak couple to die by stoning

ISLAMABAD, May 15: A 34-year-old widow and her married neighbour were sentenced to death by stoning for committing adultery, the nation's largest Urdu-language newspaper said Wednesday. The woman, identified only as Amina, and her lover, Muzur Ali, whose age was not giving, were discovered making love in a graveyard in a remote village. They were sentenced Tuesday to death by stoning, an ancient Islamic punishment, the Daily Jung reported. The couple was charged under an Islamic law known as the Hadood ordinance, which outlaws sex outside of marriage. It is also the Muslim equivalent of a rape law, reports AP.

Ted Kennedy's ex-wife arrested

QUINCY (Massachusetts). May 15: Joan Kennedy. former wife of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, was freed on bail after being arrested on drunken driving charges for the second time in

three years, police said. State Trooper Barbara Bennett said Mrs. Kennedy was spotted Tuesday evening swerving across three northbound lanes of the Southeast Expressway. Traffic was backed up behind this vehicle," Bennett said.

Mrs. Kennedy, 55, was arrested and posted 25 dollars bail soon afterward, Bennett said, reports AP.

Asians asked to return to Uganda LONDON, May 15: Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni has invited Asians expelled by dictator Idi Amin almost 20 years ago to return, the Daily Telegraph reported Wednesday. The newspaper quoted Museveni as promising in an interview that the homes and businesses of the 62,000 Asians expelled by Amin in 1972 would be returned if they came back. "They don't even have to live there - the only condition is they should start up their businesses as quickly as possible," Musevent was quoted saying, reports AP.
