

Drinking water still scarce in cyclone hit areas

BARISAL, May 16: Drinking water is still scarce in the cyclone hit coastal areas. Thousands of affected people by now are being provided with relief materials from various sources but shortage of pure drinking water made their lives miserable.

Meanwhile, 235 tubewells have been allocated on emergency basis for the affected areas including for flung islands of Bhola district. The allocation has been made as follows: For Monpura 57. Charnijam 5, Char Kukrimukri 2. Char Patila 2, Char Motahar 1, Char Jahaimatia 1, Char Fakira 2, Kachapia 1, Haziganj Embankment 2. Osmaniganj Embankment I, Kashi Khal embankment 1. Char Madraj 7, Char Jahiruddin 2. Tajumaddin embankment 2, and Daulatkhan 7. and the rest tubewells out of the total were allocated for Bhola Sadar upazila and Borhanuddin upazila carlier.

But according to a recent decision, this allocation has been reallocated further for Charfasson upaztla.

It is learnt that of the total, almost 60 per cent tubewells have already been sunk in their respective areas. According to Public Health Engineering Department (PHE) it is also learnt that the rest tubewells will immediately be sunk in the affected areas to supply pure drinking water to the distressed people.

According to Civil Surgeon of Bhola, 75 medical teams are working to provide medicare to the cyclone hit people of these areas. Besides, army medical teams are also working in the affected areas. It is to be mentioned here that except the army medical teams the other 75 medical teammembers have no necessary medicines to give to the patients. Meanwhile, three medical teams have already been

From Aroop Talukdar withdrawn.

According to Civil Surgeon of Bhola, within last two weeks diarrhoea situation has not improved. Meanwhile, diarrhoea claimed five lives affecting more than 1200.

Meanwhile, the Directorate of Public Health and Engineering (PHE) has so far made 50,000 tubewells decontaminated and repaired more than six thousand tubewells in order to ensure pure drinking water round the clock and sanitation in the cyclone hit coastal belt of the country.

Besides, 166 new tubewells have been installed out of special allotment and the annual development works are also progressing and 32 truckload of tubewell spare parts have already been sent to the affected areas, according to PHE

Fishermen hit-hard A primary survey report of

Fisheries Department revealed that thousands of fishermen who were living in the farflung islands of the vast coastal have been seriously affected Many of them lost their lives. The sarvivors lost fishing boats, nets and necessary equipment for fishing. These fishermen particularly were living on fishing in the deep

It is to be mentioned here that now-a-days supply of various fishes are decreasing in the markets all over the country. Exports of fishes have also been decreased alarmingly.

According to a report, more than three thousand enginepropelled fishing boats including modern equipment, about ten thousand general fishing boats. With sails atop and more than two hundred fishing trawlers engaged in fishing along the coastline of the Bay have been missing due to cy-

clone and deadly tidal surge. The situation also deterio rated further due to the deaths of thousands of active fisher-

men of these areas.

The wholesale fish markets of Cox's Bazar, Chittagong, Charfasson of Bhola, Bartsal Patuakhali, Kalapara and Patharghata of Borguna are remaining almost standstill.

Export hampered

Besides, export chains of fishes of various qualities have already been damaged due to sudden halt to fish procurement by BFDC and some other fish exporting concerns.

On the other hand, it is necessary to take care of the illfated fishermen who are still living losing their fishing boats, nets and necessary equipment. They should immediately be provided with necessary easy term financial loans and rehabilitation

100 transformers out of order in N. dists

THAKURGAON May 16: About 100 transformers of various capacities of the Bangladesh Power Development Board have so far been burnt in different places of the northern districts of greater Dinajpur and Rangpur. it is reliably learnt.

The transformers were cither totally or partially damaged. The major causes of the burning out of these transformers are stated to be overloading and irregular maintenance, according to a source.

It is learnt that unauthorised power connection exceeding the usual load from the electric lines have caused overloading and over burdening of the transformers. The overload of the power from a particular transformer also shortens its life.

A reliable source said that about 30 wheat crushing and husking mills and hundreds of dwelling houses including small trading shops have taken unauthorised connections, in different parts of the districts. northern

350 tubewells inoperative in Chuadanga

CHUADANGA, May 16: At least 350 tubewells have been lying inoperative for the last few months in four upazilas of the district including two pourashavas.

According to local Public Health Engineering Depart ment, the total number of tubewells in operation is 6166 of which 1308 in Chuadanga Sadar upazila, 2159 in Alam danga upazila, 1671 in Damurhuda and 1028 in Jibinagar upazila.

Acute scarcity of pure drinking water has been prevailing in the rural areas causing immense sufferings to the thousands of people as a large number of tubewells went out of order. The number of tubewells in two pourashava areas of the district is quite inadequate to meet the require-

ments. Of the total disordered tubewells, 57 are in Chuadanga Sadar, 80 in Alamdanga, 195 in Damurhuda and 18 in Jibinagar upazila.

The government has taken up a programme to resink 96 disordered tubewells during the current financial year of which 27 have already been resunk and the rest 69 would be resunk shortly, it is expected. To cope up with the requirements the people are using water from ponds, canals


