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Rajiv assassinated

SRIPERUMPUDUR (Tamil Nadu), May 21: The former Prime Minister and AICC (1) President, Rajiv Gandhi, was killed in a bomb explosion in Tamil Nadu's Sriperumpudur, 40 km from Madras while on a campaign tour in the state tonight, reports PTI.

Gandhi's head was blown off in the explosion which occurred at 2220 hours as he got down from his car to address a public meeting in this town.

More than a dozen other persons were also feared killed in the blast.

The Congress (I) President had arrived in Madras this evening from Andhra Pradesh on a two-day election tour of the state, tonight and tomor-

Gandhi's body was lying in a pool of blood along with several other unidentified bodies.

Security men immediately cordoned off the area and were trying to rush the casualties to nearby hospitals.

The explosion which took place at the venue of the public meeting, 10 metres from the dais, could be heard about 200 metres away.



Gandhi's death was a brutal one, similar to the one his mother, Indira Gandhi had suffered in 1984.

Gandhi was jostling with partymen and admirers at the venue at the time of explosion. When police officials and party leaders, including G K Moopanar, realised that the explosion had occurred, they found Gandhi's body with his head severed.

body the Congressmen broke down even while they were in a state of tremendous shock

Immediately after the explosion people ran helterskelter and chest-beating and wailing men shouted "Rajiv enge, Rajiv enge" (where is Rajiv, where is Rajiv).

A PTI correspondent, barely 30 yards away from the explosion site, found Gandhi's body lying with his head smashed.

Several bodies were lying near his body. Two or three of the severely injured persons, with wounds all over their bodies, were found twitching.

Dazed policemen were trying to bring about some semblance of order and control. It

took several minutes for the policemen to pull out Gandhi's body from the pile of bodies heaped at the spot.

The air was filled with smoke and the stench of burning flesh.

Among those who sustained minor injures was the Congress-I MP of the dissolved Lok Sabha, Mrs Jayanthi Natarajan. Several other Congress(I) women with On identifying Gandhi's blood-stained clothes were wailing, "They have killed

> Several state Congress(i) leaders, including GK Moopanar, escaped unhurt as they happened to be a few feet away from the explosion site.

A maximum alert was announced in Delhi tonight following Gandhi's death. A police spokesman said,

the entire police force was kept on a state of full preparedness to meet any law and order situation in the capital.

Mrs Sonia Gandhi, wife of Rajiv Gandhi and their children, Priyanka and Rahul,

It was a foregone conclusion that Rajiv's Congress(I) would emerge as the single majority party in the election for the Lok Sabha (Parliament). There were some indication that he may even get an absolute majority as Indian's may forgive his past mistakes and opt for a stable government that only his Congress could provide. Now that prospect of stability appears also to have eluded them.

Rajiv Gandhi's assassination is of particular concern to all of us in South Asia, because it comes at a time when India's unity was already under heavy strain through the emergence of various divisive forces in many parts of the country.

While we mourn the death of Rajiv Gandhi, we hope that this tragic event will strengthen the resolve of the Indian people to uphold the principles of freedom, democracy, secularism, tolerence and peace that he so valiantly fought, throughout whole life, to establish.

# WB alone withdraws \$368m aid pledge

The World Bank alone has so far withdrawn development aid commitments amounting to 368 million US dollars due to inadequate preparation and unsatisfactory progress in project implementation in Bangladesh.

The amount represents 10 per cent of the Bank's cumulative aid disbursements of 3.8 billion dollars till date.

The bank may have to cancel more aid in the existing pipeline of 1.34 billion dollars unless aid utilisation performance improves.

Similar cancellations of aid commitments were made by other donor countries and agencies over the years, reflecting what the donor circles said in Dhaka, "poor aid absorption capacity Bangladesh". The project aid pipeline has been bulging. It is likely to stand at 5.6 billion dollars by June next.

Resident Representative of the World Bank mission in Dhaka Christopher Willoughby told The Daily Star in an exclusive interview on Tuesday that effective and faster utilisation of aid, already in the pipeline, should be the main priority of the government. "Mere fresh aid pledges will not change the economic scenario in Bangladesh unless aid absorption capacity can be substantially increased ", he said.

He observed, "There is lot of hope, goodwill and sympathy among the donors for the newly installed democratic government in Bangladesh and more so now after the devastating cyclone". But there is also a demand for better performances for higher aid pledges and commitments, he

Willoughby said that Bangladesh would require adequate flows of cash foreign exchange for balance of payments support and budgetary resource management after the

The Aid Club in its meeting in Paris will discuss the overall plan and aid requirements which will be somewhat larger for next year.

The World Bank recommended 2.2 billion US dollars as fresh aid pledges by the donors at the forthcoming Paris meeting. The amount may be higher now and the Bank is awaiting the detailed assessment by the Bangladesh government about its requirements of additional support considering the impact of the cyclone on the overall econ-See Page 10 Col. 1

She said the people of Bangladesh had welcomed efforts of the Task Force to mitigate the sufferings of the cyclone survivors.
