But her bid to emulate brother Emilio's success in Sunday's Italian Open final faltered in the tie-break where Graf's nerve held sufficiently to register the 57th tournament victory of her career.

The 21-year-old German has now won over 7.2 million dollars in prize money.

Before the match Grafs recent fine form and nine wins in 10 meetings between the players had pointed to only one outcome.

Yet for much of the final two sets it was Sanchez Vicario who looked the more likely winner, chasing around the court as if her life depend on

Even after Graf had pulled herself back in front at 6-5 in the third, the chunky Spaniard broke her serve to love and entered the tie-break with visions of a repeat of her 1989 French Open triumph against the same opponent.


