Iraqi Gen, troops join Shi'ite forces

Reports from Damascus say that a Iraqi General and his troops have defected to the Shifte rebel forces in southern Iraq and have cut off a main road leading to the port of Basra, according to AIR monttored in Dhaka.

A statement by the exiled Shi'ites claimed that the rebels have gained control of two towns near Basra.

Reuter from Baghdad adds: Talks on Kurdish autonomy were going well and should result in a final agreement next week, the pro-government Kurdish newspaper Altrag reported Saturday.

"The dialogue between the (Iraqi) political leadership and a team representing Kurdish parties has reached a new phase on the road of achieving a final agreement strengthening national unity and consolidating the self-rule experiment," the paper said.

It quoted sources close to the negotiations as saying: "In the light of optimism prevailing over the dialogue, a final agreement is expected within

the coming week".

A Kurdish rebel leader told Reuter on Wednesday it could take up to two weeks to reach an agreement with Baghdad on Kurdish autonomy.


Massoud Barzani, the head of a Kurdish delegation representing eight guerilla groups negotiating with the central government, said they had made most progress on the guidelines for democracy in

"The new agreement now being drawn up will ensure a stronger position in facing hostile designs," Al-Iraq said.

The Kurdish team has been in Baghdad for more than two. weeks. The talks followed abortive uprisings by Kurds in

the north and Shi'ite Muslims in the south after the Gulf war.

A first round of talks last month led to an agreement in principle to revive a 1970 accord which recognised the Kurds as a distinct nation and gave them extensive rights to run their own affairs.



75,000 killed in Salvador: Representatives of El Salvador's government and leftist guerillas on Saturday opened a decisive round of peace talks to end the 11-year civil war that has killed more than 75,000 people, Reuter reports from Caracas.

Government negotiators and commanders of the rebel Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front (FMLN) arrived in Caracas on Friday and met Venezuelan Presidential Secretariat Minister Beatrice Rangel behind closed doors on

Saturday. After the meeting at the Presidential palace the delegates from the war-torn Central American Nation declined to speak to reporters, on the prospects for the talks, organised under the auspices of the United Nation.

Angolan foes to remove mines:

With a provisional ceasefire between the Angolan army and UNITA rebels reported to be holding for a 10th day Saturday, the two forces are to begin removing land mines on roads near the central town of Waku Kungo. AP reports from Luanda.

Senior officers from both sides said Saturday they reached agreement at a meeting held late Friday as part of efforts by a joint military commission set up Tuesday to monitor the

They belong to one of the sub-commissions established by Tuesday's agreement. Their body is responsible for central Angola.

Deactivation of the mines is aimed at ensuring security for road traffic, mainly conveys taking food supplies to Waku Kung in Cuanza Sul province, some 350 kilometers (218 miles) southeast of Luanda, the officers said.

9 Soviet republics sign accord: Russian leader Boris Yeltsin said Saturday nine of the 15 Soviet republies were in nearly complete agreement on signing a treaty to preserve the nation and rename it the Union of Soviet Sovereign Republics, AP reports from

Moscow. At a news conference marking the end of a five-day session of the Russian Congress of People's Deputies, Yeltsin said that the consensus-building in the Soviet Union would allow the individual republics to play a greater role in the world

economy. The agreement to rename the country came at an eighthour meeting Friday attended by President Mikhail S Gorbachev and the heads of eight of the nine republics,

including Yeltsin, the Russian leader said. He said all the republics agreed to retain the initials "USSR", but change the name "Union of Soviet Socialist Republics" to "Union of Soviet Sovereign Republics.

Cholera kills 12 in Colombia: A cholera epidemic sweeping south America has killed 12 people in Colombia and 897 others are being treated in hospital, Colombia's National Health Institute said on

Saturday, reports Reuter from Bogota. The epidemic broke out in Peru earlier this year and spread to Ecuador, Colombia, Brazil and Chile, killing more than 1,000 people, doctors blame the rapid spread of the disease on lack of sewage systems and clean drinking water. A world bank study has said it would cost 50 billion dollars to install adequate sanitation throughout Latin America.

904 drug dealers arrested: Panamanian authorities aided by US officials have arrested at least 904 drug dealers and seized 5,313 kilos (11,700 pounds) of cocaine in the first five months of this year in a multi-front offensive against Colombian drug cartels, according to a US report obtained Saturday by AFP from Panama City.

But the confidential US Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) document said that, inspite of these successes, US officials were concerned about an increasing presence here of the Cali Cartel, money laundering, Colombian Drug Transhipment and Drug Consumption in Panama.

Perez for Ethiopian ceasefire: UN Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar on Saturday appealed to warring Ethiopians to call an immediate

ceasefire, Reuter reports from United Nations. The Secretary General has been following with growing concern the unfolding events in Ethiopia said a UN

statement. He appeals to all sides to observe an immediate ceasefire. In order to enhance the chances of success of a negotiated

settlement it said. The statement called on all parties in Ethiopia to cooperate with UN humanitarian assistance programmes which the statement said will be intensified with a view to

meeting the needs of the people of Ethiopia.

Bid to end S African violence: Government, church and business leaders have launched a fresh attempt to end black township violence, the main

obstacle to power-sharing talks leading to a post-apartheid South Africa, reports Reuter. A two-day peace summit in Pretoria, boycotted by the African National Congress (ANC) and its allies, decided on Saturday to set up two committees to help organise talks

acceptable to all parties. The ANC, the main black organisation fighting apartheid, shunned the meeting because it was convened by the government, but says it is willing to attend a conference

organised by an impartial group. About 1,800 people have been killed in the past nine months in battles in the black townships, largely between supporters of the ANC and the Inkatha Freedom Party led by Zulu chief Mangosuthu Buthelezi.

Police in the southern Indian city of Madras say they have obtained a video film which could be crucial evidence in the hunt for the killers of Rajiv Gandhi. The film is said to show the full scquence of events leading to the explosion which killed Gandhi. The woman still regarded as the key suspect who had been seen walking her way to garland Gandhi with flowers, according to BBC

monitored in Dhaka. The authorities have stepped up securities in Madras airport and are reported to be questioning Sri Lankan leaving India.





Video-tape shows a fourth woman

NEW DELHI, May 26: A videotape of the last moments of former Indian premier Rativ Gandhi shows a " Fourth woman" handing him a bouquet seconds before the explosion that killed him, a newspaper here said on Sunday, reports AFP.

The Sunday Observer in a front page article said it had been privy to an exclusive screening of the video, which was confiscated by the Research and Analysis Wing (RAW). India's CIA and FBI rolled into one.

Reports to date have focused suspicion on one of three women who garlanded the former premier just before the massive explosion that killed him and 17 others at an election rally in an obscure south Indian town Tuesday

The Observer said the black and white video showed Gandhi accepting and donning the garlands from the three women, and "as Rajiv almost passes this point a fourth (woman) appears on the screen".

" The explosion went off barely one second after the Congress chief accepted the bouquet from this woman, who was partially obscured by the other three," the newspaper

It went on to say that all

that could be seen on the tape of the "fourth woman" was her left shoulder and arm, in a dark half-sleeved blouse.

The tape then showed Gandhi turning with the "large round" bouquet held high with both hands towards the speaking dais where he was to address the crowd.

" Almost immediately there is a loud boom and the screen goes blindingly white," the newspaper said, adding that the evidence on the tape opens various possibilities including there being more than one bomb.

Reports leaked from investigators have said the explosive used was a plastic explosive often used in military operations, and of the same type that killed a prominent Sri Lankan politician in March.

bomber with explosives wired to her body was the key suspect, and the bomb was designed to explode when she leaned over.

Sahay said a wire, a spring and an imported battery had been found among the remains of the women's torso, adding that the upper portion of her body was completely blown off.

Another reports adds: Thousands of Srt Lankan Tamils are worried about their future in India following the shock assassination of former Premier Rajtv Gandhi by a woman suspected to be a Tamil militant.

Sri Lankans say the Tamtis, almost all of them refugees are keeping their fingers crossed after leading Indian politicians called for their repatriation to protest Gandhi's killing.

The Indian government has not responded to the demands, and it is widely believed the calls would not be heeded, but relief workers say that has not eased the refugees fears.

There is a lot of apprehension (among refugees), said S. Chandrahasahn, a Sri Lankan Tamil in Madras, capital of the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu where the 46-year-old Gandhi was killed by a powerful bomb Tuesday.

The killing in Sriperumpudur town near Madras has been blamed on a young

Rahul collects Rajiv's ashes

NEW DELHI, May 26: The son of slain former premier Rajiv Gandhi collected his father's ashes at dawn Sunday from the cremation site here in an elaborate Hind ritual marred by black clouds and rain, reports AFP.

Gandhi's only son Rahul, a Harvard student, carried out the hour-long ritual on the bank of the Yamuna river assisted by Hindu priests.

The 30 vessels carrying the ashes were taken to Mr. Gandhi's childhood home, Teen Murti House, where they will remain until Monday.

Then they are to be carried by special train to the city of Allahabad, some 500 kilometers (312 miles) south of here, which marks the confluence of two great rivers sacred to Hindus, the Ganges and the Yamuna.

Thatcher to quit parliament

LONDON, May 26: Former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher is to quit parliament to concentrate on her role in world affairs, according to a report in the Sunday Express, reports AFP.

The conservative weekly said that Thatcher would announce her resignation as MP in two weeks time.

It said, her recent trips to the United States and South Africa and now to the Soviet Union had brought about the realisation that "Far from being side lined since resigning as Prime Minister, she still has a vital role to play in world affairs."

Thousands of Burmese flee Thai town

MAE SOT (Thailand), May 26: Thousands of Burmese have fled the frontier town of Mae Sot after That army officers threatened to turn them over to Rangoon authorities.

More than 2,500 had already left the prosperous trading centre on the Thai-Burma border, a Thai officer told Reuter on Saturday.

Most were heading for their home villages across the border near Myawadi but 700 were seeking shelter at a nearby refugee camp run by the Karen Ethnic minority.

The That army said last week it planned to send more than 20,000 Burmese illegal immigrants back across the border by the end of May.

The Military Junta in Rangoon has been seeking the return of dissidents who fled the supression of a student-led pro-democracy uprising in

That officers say most of the illegal immigrants are in Thai-land to find work.

Rousing cheers for William Kennedy

WASHINGTON: William Kennedy Smith received his medical school diploma Saturday to the rousing cheers of those attending graduation ceremonies in the hall named for his late uncle John F. Kennedy, reports AP.

Smith, dressed in cap and gown, smiled as he walked across the stage at the Kennedy Center Concert Hall amid sustained applause and cheering from the audience and other graduates of the Georgetown University School of Medicine. The 30-year-old medical student has been the focus of na-

tionwide attention since a woman accused him of raping her at the Kennedy family estate in Palm Beach, Florida, on March Smith, who has denied the allegations, has been charged

SEATTIE: A motorist who wants to end the stigma associated with menopause almost didn't get to keep her personalized license plates that read "MENOPOZ," until a licensing official going through the same rite of passage intervened, reports AP.

"There's nothing offensive or indecent about menopause," said the motorist, 50-year-old Dorothy Mitchell. "Even if it's on my license plates."

She was told there had been a complaint and her plates were being cancelled

"It has come to our attention that the phrase used on your personalized plate, MENOPOZ, is offensive to good taste and decency," said a letter from Bob Andercon, assistant director of vehicle services in the state department of Licensing.

Under state law, the department can refuse to issue or withdraw such plates, said Anderson, who also sent Mitchell new license plates.

On Friday, however, the state had a change of heart. "It's time for menopause to come out of the closet," Licensing Director Mary Faulk told Mitchell. "I'm 48 and I'm going through it also."

Faulk said she reversed the decision "because I don't think a normal process of aging to be in bad taste."

Mitchell, who works in customer service at a United Parcel Service office, said she got the idea for the MENOPOZ late after she bought a "dumb, sporty new car" six months ago.

"I bought the car on impulse, and when I told my dad, he wanted to know why I did that because I always have been very conservative," she said. "I told him that it must have been ny menopausal phase - and then I thought. I'll put that on ny heense plate."

Rajiv was like a son to me, says priest

NEW DELHI, May 26: When The grandfather of three, who news broke that Rajiv Gandhi had been assassinated, the family of the former Indian Prime Minister summoned one man to help to lay his soul to rest - Hindu priest Ganpat Ram Acharya, reports Reuter.

The 70-year-old Brahmin, who has cremated three generations of the Nehru-Gandhi political dynasty. immediately began organising the funeral rites according to ancient Hindhu tradition.

was shocked when I first heard he had been killed." Ganpat said in an interview on Sunday as he stood on the sprawling grounds of Teen Murti House, where Gandhi grew up, watching over the copper urns containing the ashes of the late leader.

I did not believe it could happened. Soon after, I was called by the family to prepare for the funeral." said Ganpat, an expert in Hindu and Vedic religious rituals who has become the priest of the Nehru-Gandhi family.
