The Met office in Dhaka said Dhaka recorded 123 millimetres (about five inches) rainfall, the season's highest, during the 24 hours ending at 6 am on the day.

It started raining heavily from the early hours of Tuesday. By the morning the intensity of rainfall lessened. Drizzles continued till 11 am. Water-logging caused seri-


