Red Crescent takes up Tk 110cr projects in high-risk coastal zone

Bangladesh Red Crescent Society would construct 300 multi-purpose cyclone shelters in high-risk coastal zone at a cost of Taka 85 crore along with its two other programmes.

Addressing a press conference at the National Press Club, Chairman of the Society Maj Gen (retd) A F M Abdul Hug said the other two proiects are multi-dimensional rehabilitation programme for about 50,000 worst-affected families and replacement and increase of damaged equipments of Cyclone Preparedness Programme (CPP). The total cost of these three short and long-term projects is about Taka 110 crore.

General Hug said that nearly 35 lakh people are living in 42 high risk locations in 17 coastal upazilas.

The society has 62 cyclone shelters with infrastructure of disaster preparedness which was constructed after a cyclone in Urir Char in 1985.

Those shelters were fully used during April 29 cyclone which claimed more than 139,000 lives and left hun-

British aid for flood-hit people

The British Government will provide about Tk 13 lakh to assist CARE (Britain) in helping affected families of the recent floods in the districts of Sylhet, Moulvibazar and Habigani, reports UNB.

A press release of the British High Commission said Wednesday that CARE will use the funds to deliver emergency packages containing essentials like chira, molasses, salt, medicines, candles, and matchboxes to nearly 8,000

The Red Crescent Chairman said that immediately after the cyclone the head quarters of the Society despatched stocked relief materials and stand-by medical teams as part of a post-flood emergency programme under which 6,50,000 people were assisted and a total of 850 metric tons of food and 100 metric tons of non-food relief materials were distributed in a fortnight.

The Society's managing board drew up another relief programme with the League of Red Cross and Red Crescent for assisting 3,25,000 people.

The Society has so far received food items, medicine, tents, and tarpaulin weighing 275 metric tons from its worldwide units.

The third project at a cost of Tk 15 lakh is to replace damaged CPP equipments and to establish 400 new CPP units to cover rest of the coastal belt. New wireless network to connect the remote and inaccessible areas will also be set up under the programme.

It also included motivation and training programme to create public awareness about cyclone warning and protection measures.

Replying a question Mr Huq said that he was hopeful of getting necessary funds from abroad to take up the funds.

Chief delegate of the League of Red Cross and Red Crescent Marcel Fortier Secretary General of the Society Major (retd) Ali Hassan Quoreshi and the members of the adhoc managing board were present at the press conference.

They also distributed more than 20 metric tons of relief materials including rice, wheat, atta, dal biscuits, milk powder, sugar, old clothes, saree and tents among the flood victims of Sylhet, Sunamgani and Moulavibazar.

Bangladesh Navy Ships operating from Chittagong, Khulna and Barisal on Wednesday despatched a large quantity of relief goods including edible oil and other necessaries while a frigate of the Bangladesh Navy has been deployed to assist the foreign naval ships now engaged in the relief missions in these areas

Royal Marines save 1,000 villagers from A Special Correspondent

CHITTAGONG, May 29: An island population of 1,000 was saved from starvation yesterday by a Royal Navy helicopter

Four tons of relief supplies donated by the charity CARE were flown into the low-lying island of Sonadia following a Navy reconnaissance mission which discovered their plight yesterday. "If these people had not received supplies they would have died," said CARE worker Mrs Sajeda Begum. "They are fisher people, but now they cannot fish because they have lost their boats and their nets have been damaged."

She said relief supplies would maintain the community for another six days during which follow-up aid could be arranged giving them time to rebuild and restore their boats and nets. "They had some food here but that was nearly all gone. Now they are very happy They hoped that God would send someone to save their

lives. Their belief is very strong."

At CARE's request the Navy had provided a helicopter for reconnaissance of outlying communities in the Cox's Bazar area which suffered the full force of the cyclone and tidal wave. "These places are cut off and little or no relief had been sent since the disaster," said Commander Mike Norman RN Senior Naval Officer coordi-

nating Britain's relief effort. "In reconnaissance sweep, with CARE workers on board the aircraft, we landed at a number of locations. Some communities have been relatively unaffected but on Sonadia we found this isolated community which had lost everything in the storm. All about us were pitiful heaps of timber and corrugated iron sheeting. In some places only a stone doorstep remained to show where a house had stood.

"The men, women and children were in desperate need and I shall always remember the joy and gratitude on the faces of those people when the stores arrived.

King supplied emergency packs containing rice, molasses, water purification tablets and clothing. CARE workers were also flown in to identify critical needs. "One of the villagers' biggest problems is that the tidal wave which swept over the island contaminated most of their fresh-water wells," said British aid worker Trevor Martin. "The wells are quite shallow -30-40 ft-so among other things CARE will sink a 700 ft deep well which will guarantee water supply." Mr Martin, from Torquay and a former History of Art teacher at Manchester and Weymouth, is spending two years in Bangladesh as part of the Voluntary Service Overseas Scheme. "There is great poverty and widespread sickness in villages such as these in normal cfreumstances," he

said. "The cyclone took away from them what little they had." Thanks to a nearby con-

Making two drops the Sea cretestorm shelter no one in the village died in the cyclone. "However, they do now have the problem of how to survive without adequate food and shelter.

A Bangladesh Red Crescent doctor who had volunteered to live and work on the island said that a shortage of food and of uncontaminated water had led to widespread illness since the disaster.

With meagre medical supplies he was attempting to treat diarrhoea, respiratory and urinary tract infections, scables, worms and various forms of trauma.

The helicopter, of 826 Naval Air Squadron, which lifted the supplies to the island is one of four operating from the 23,000 ton Royal Fleet Auxiliary ship Fort Grange anchored off Cox's Bazar.
