Club Cup kicks off today

The stage is set for the BTC Club Cup charity football tournament in aid of the April 29 eyclone victims with the celebrated East Bengal Club of Calcutta meeting local Brothers Union in the curtain raiser to day at the Dhaka Stadium. The match kicks off at 4.30 pm.

In the second match of day. at 6.30 pm, Mohun Bagan will face their traditional arch Calcutta rivals Mohammedan Sporting.

Sports Minister for Youth and Sports Sadeq Hossain Khoka will inaugurate the six team, eight day meet.

The BFF and BTV settled their differences over match royalties yesterday and as a result Bangladesh Television will

telecast live all the nine matches of the meet from the Dhaka Stadium.

BTV will pay Taka 50,000 per match to BFF for the telecasting rights.

The tournament is being jointly organised by the Bangladesh Football Federation and the Dhaka Metropolis Football Clubs Association with three leading teams from Calcutta and Dhaka fighting for the honours.

The Big Three of Calcutta soccer - Calcutta Mohammedans, East Bengal and Mohun Bagan and the giants of Dhaka soccer — Abahani Krira Chakra, Dhaka Mohammedans and Brothers Union - have been split in two clusters with the top two finishers in the robin league qualifying for the semifinals scheduled for June 4 and 5.

The final will be on June 7. The tourney is being sponsored by the Bangladesh Tobacco Company (BTC) who are

providing the organisers with a sum of Tk eight lakh, but organisers hope to reap in another 26 lakh from gate re-

Conditions were perfect— a great stadium, great fans from both sides, great weather and a great atmosphere.

But the soccer was pitiful as the Yugoslavs showed an astonishing lack of ambition, contenting themselves with sti fling the Marsetlle build-ups and scarcely attempting any serious attacks of their own.

The result was a match ai most totally devote of interest. despite the presence of great players on each team such as Prosinecki and Dejan Savicevic for Red Star and Marseille's

Chris Waddle and Abedi Pele. Morsetile tried but at the end of a long season they lacked the freshness and imagination to unlock the secrets of the massed Yugoslav defence.

They did have a few chances, the best 13 minutes from the end of normal time when Englishman Waddle was agonisingly just wide with a header form close range after a cross from captain Jean-Pierre

Waddle was close again on the stroke of full time with another header, a miss which once again proved costly for Marseille, continuing a dismal series for French clubs in Europe.

The outcome left France still unable to boast a winner in the history of the three European competitions.



Botham rules himself out

LONDON, May 30: Injured England all-rounder lan Botham said on Thursday he had abandoned all hope of being fit in time for the first crieket Test against West Indies next week, reports Reuter.

"I don't think I could honestly say I could get through a five-day match," he said in a radio interview.

"To be fair to the team and myself, I think it's best if I say no' now."

Botham tore a hamstring during the first one-day international, his first appearance for England in almost two

His four wickets in that match coupled with a century against West Indies when playing for Worcestershire a few days earlier looked to have made him a near-certainty for the first Test which starts next Thursday.

"It's obviously very disappointing because I was in a bit of a purple patch. It's up to me to be sensible with the injury and then hopefully get some runs and wickets as soon as I get back," Botham said.

His comments came as the England selectors were meeting to pick the Test squad which will be announced on




