round match in straight sets to unseeded Spaniard Jorde Arrese in Monte Carlo in April. Borg's appearance in





BARCELONA, June 4: The head of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) Juan Antonio Samaranch, says he has" total confidence" in security at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, despite a bloody terrorist campaign which claimed nine lives near here last week, reports AFP.
