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

Mahtab suggests tightening belt

Dr Fasihuddin Mahtab, a former Planning Minister, believes that time is high for adopting pragmatic measures to alleviate growing poverty in the country.

"Nothing is impossible, we have to face the challenges and solve the problems. Scope still exists to overcome the crisis" he said.

Talking to The Daily Star. on 1991-92 budget proposals, he also dwelt on the economic situation of the country.

Dr Mahtab, a technocrat, served the BNP government as Planning Minister for about three years till the end of

1981 and then continued as Finance Minister upto 24 March, 1982. Mahtab looked at the proposed budget as being better than those of the past nine

years but said he had some reservations.

"I am not happy with this
