



## Barcelona tickets

SYDNEY, June 22: The Australian men's hockey tean virtually sealed a place at the Barcelona Olympics after downing New Zealand 5-0 in reports AFP.

The world's top-ranked side, keen for revenge after drawing 1-1 in the first Test in Auckland last weekend, took only 35 seconds to score their first goal, from the stick of veteran mark Hagar, and never looked like losing.


The Kiwis entered the Australian circle just five times in the entire match and had only one real shot at goal, 20 minutes into the second half. In contrast the Australians had 22 shots -10 in the first half and 12 in the second.

Australian coach Frank Murray was delighted with his team's effort. "It's as good as we have played for a long time," he said. "New Zealand would have to win 6-0 in tomorrow's final Test to prevent us going to Barcelona, and don't believe they can do that Australia's second goal came
