Notes from Barisal

From Our Correspondent BARISAL, June 28 : Erratic power supply to Barisal town and its adjourning areas has been eausing untold sufferings

to the people for a long time.

Power fathers has become a
regular feature in the town and adjoining areas hampering not only the lives of the inhabitants but also the regular production of small-scale industries. Power failure is also creating and the buyers.

Same times over loading of power disrupts transformers which caused irregular supply of power to the consumers in different places. It is learnt that unauthorised power connections exceeding the usual load from the electric lins have caused overloading and over burdening of the transformers. The overload of the power from a particular transformer also shortens its life. PDB officials are reportedly ignorant about these unauthorised connection. In these way PDB is being deprived of huge amount of revenue. The low voltage has also been attributed to such overloading.

Experts say, delay in snap-ping these unauthorised connections will cost the PDB many other transformers in the district.

Mushroom growth of hotels and restaurants in the town and its adjoining areas are becoming a threat to the public health in general stale and adulterated foodstuffs are sold in these hotels and restaurants, it is alleged.

The dishonest traders are devoid of public health hazards. They are almost engaged with such stale, dirty and adulterated foods are causing serious health hazards in these ar-

It is to be mentioned here that the responsibility of examining the adulterated foods lies with the sanitary inspectors but he rarely visits the hotels and restaurants for checking the foods ready for sale to the public. As a result, the people of

these areas are suffering from various diseases like dysentery. hepatitis and other peptic ailments. The attention of the con-

cerned authorities is drawn to take immediate steps to eradicate this social menace.

Prices of essentials

The commodities falling under the new tax proposals in the budget by new recorded a modest uptrend in prices in the different markets of the district. Wholesellers of different

commodities particularly essentials in the markets said that the prices of ecyabean oil. food have slightly increased than before.

Sources said due to short supply of some commodities prices have showed slight rise than before but it will not continue for longtime. Only for condensed milk price has shown almost abnormal rise in the markets. Price of condensed milk rose about Taka 70 per carton of four dozens. A carton of condensed milk is now selling at Taka 1050 to Taka 1065 . Palm oil is selling at Taka 40-43 per kg which is 3 to 5 Taka more per kg than pre-budget price.

It is learnt that the import of palm oil has been suspended for the last six months

although the demand is high. On the other hand, it is also learnt that the prices of powdered milk and ball pen did not increase in the wholesale markets but retailers have increased prices of these items.
