LONDON, July Warwickshire's Tim Munton produced the best bowling figures of the English season to rock Middlesex at Edgabson on Wednesday but failed to prevent last year's county champions from taking a narrow first innings lead, reports Reuter.

The England seamer bowled a marathon 30.1 overs to take eight for 89 as Warwickshire piled on the pressure in humid conditions on the second-day of the three-day game.

But Middlesex were rescued by a career-best 77 from Neil Williams and recovered from 133 for six to 237 all out, seven ahead


